FARM NEWS

Clayton May Elected
Hog Producer President

Charles Melnis of Iroquois president of the Ontario Hog Producers' Association, was the chief speaker at the annual meeting of the Halton Hog Producers' Association held in Milton on Tuesday afternoon.

Mr. Melnis who was introduced by P. Merry, dealt with criticism which in recent months has been levelled at the producers' sales agency. Mr. Melnis appealed for support for the United Livestock Sales on the basis of the agency's record in raising the price paid to producers of Ontario hogs an average of \$2.00 per hog, in the two years since the agency's formation.

He further stated that the right of producers to market their own product through their own marketing agency would be challenged in the courts during the next few months. He further reported that with the whole-hearted support of all hog producers and transporters, an even better job could be done by the producers' marketing agency. If direct deliveries were curtailed to the processing plants, and sent to the stock yards packers would be more active in bidding for their quota of hogs.

Chas. Newton, zone director to the hog producers' marketing agency also spoke, giving an excellent review of hog marketing over the years up to the formation of the Marketing Agency. Mr. Newton informed the meeting of his intention to retire as a director on the Marketing Agency at the annual meeting in March due to the fact that he had sold his farm and is now not a hog producer. The Halton meeting passed a resolution in support of the Marketing Agency and urged the continuance of the Marketing Agency's efforts towards the setting up of a national agency.
