Local Doctor Views TV Closed Program

Dr. John D. Keith, physician in charge, cardiac clinic and service, announced there has been a reduction of 10 per cent in strep diseases at the Hospital for Sick Children in Toronto during the past thirty years. Dr. Keith was a participant in the largest closed circuit television program ever presented, with scientific papers being delivered by outstanding United States and Canadian medical authorities.

In 64 cities in Canada and the United States more than 30,000 doctors and medical students gathered before large screen television viewers in hotel ballrooms and TV studios for the international closed circuit television symposium, sponsored in Canada jointly by the College of General Practice and John Wyeth and Brother (Canada) Ltd. Dr. J. H. Chamberlain of town was numbered in the group which viewed the program in Toronto.

Dr. Keith stated that strep diseases now account for less than one per cent of the deaths among infants and children. The marked decline is complicated diseases resulting from strep infections is the result of marked improvement in treatment methods. The greatest decline has occurred since 1945 when penicillin became available.

This was the first medical television program to link the physicians of Canada and the United States in postgraduate medical study. The program was viewed in Canada in Toronto, Montreal, Kingston, Ottawa and Quebec City.

Dr. Gene H. Stollerman, medical director of Irvington House for children with Heart Disease, Irvington, N.Y., declared that "prompt and proper treatment of initial strep infections will prevent initial attacks of rheumatic fever."

Dr. Stollerman in his paper emphasized time and again that to prevent rheumatic fever the "streptococcus itself must be eradicated." "To achieve eradication, penicillin is the drug of choice," Dr. Stollerman said. "Sulfonamides are ineffective in this regard."

Dr. Stollerman described a new long-acting form of penicillin known as benzathine penicillin or bicillin in which a single intramuscular injection of 1.2 million units will provide an effective level for as long as three to four weeks.

Dr. C. H. Rammelkamp, Jr., professor of medicine at Western Reserve University and director of the Streptococcal Disease Laboratory in Cheyenne, Wyoming, stated, "it may be impossible to eliminate rheumatic fever and nephritis from the entire population, because of the strep disease complications which develop after the clinically apparent and inapparent infections."

"If the general population the only method presently available for prevention of rheumatic fever is the treatment of the strep infection itself."
