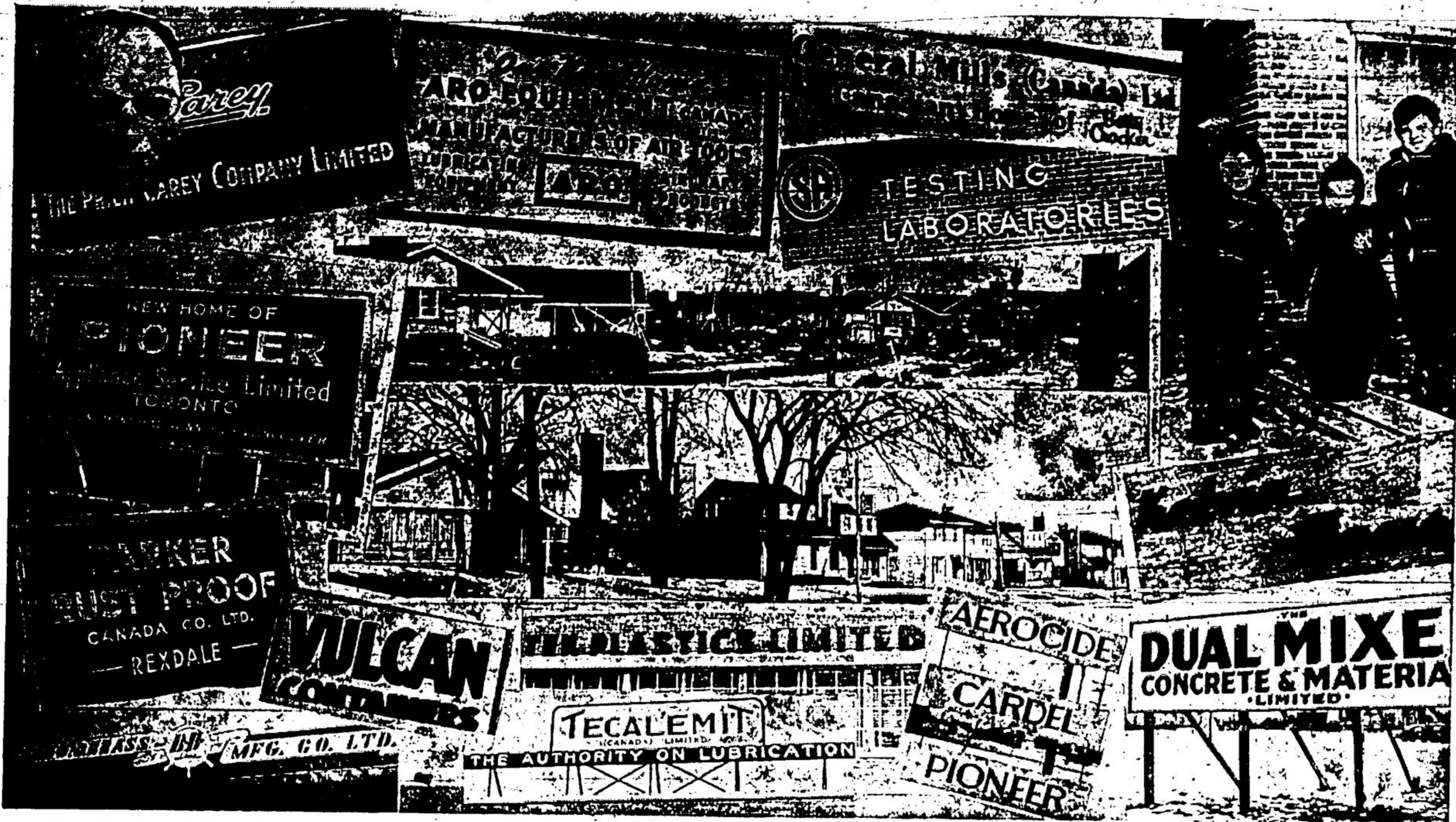


WILL GEORGETOWN LOOK LIKE THIS?

The same thing is planned here and Mr. Heslop's proposals are now before the Dept. of Planning and Development for their approval. First stage, con-

struction of several hundred houses on the H. Craig Reid farm will be underway later this spring, and there should be some industrial news too before many months go by.

Discuss Repairs To Huttonville Dam

Further investigation of the condition and repairs which might prove necessary to Huttonville dam has been ordered undertaken by the Credit Valley Conservation Author-

ity. The project is to be studied by the Flood Control and Pollution Advisory Board. This was decided at the fourth meeting of the authority held recently in Snelgrove. H. F. Crown, speaking on behalf of the minister of planning and development, told the meeting that the

report of the engineer indicated that the recent inspection had not been extensive enough to determine the costs of repairs. Much more time to prepare plans and specifications would be needed, he said. The department would find the cost and pay 75 per cent of the cost of such study. Mr. Crown added that residents of areas near Huttonville and along the Credit River below the village are fearful that alleged weakening of the dam last fall may endanger their homes should serious flooding occur now. Recommendations of the investigating body will be submitted to the authority when prepared.

Former Brampton councillor, W. M. Robinson moved that the Credit and Etobicoke Authorities request the department of planning and development for a fieldman to work with the two authorities for 1955. Hugh Griggs, chairman of the authority, told the meeting that Etobicoke had shared a flood control officer with Ganaraska. He suggested that the two local authorities might share a fieldman.

A request from Toronto Township and Port Credit that the authority area be enlarged to include sections of the township and towns, which were not in either of the local conservation areas, was granted. Deputy Reeve Thomas Jackson and Councillor Lloyd Heridge were appointed along with A. M. Greenaway to represent the two municipalities. The 1954 executive was re-elected for the coming year.

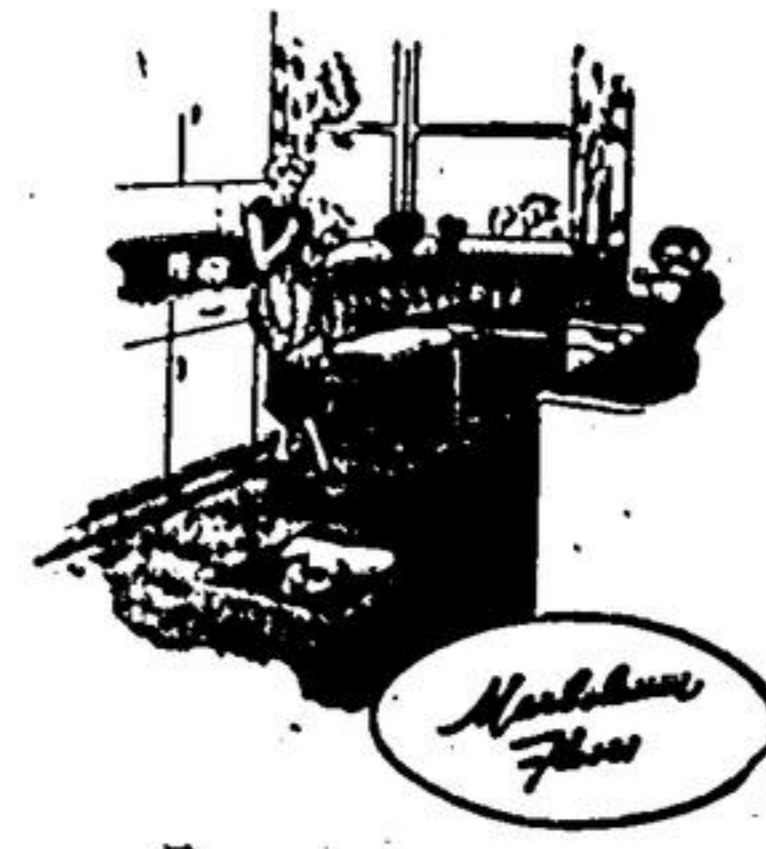
Stark, Harrop Again On Maple Unit Board

A total of 47,567 cows were artificially bred by the 37 bull in the stud of the Maple Cattle breeders in 1954, stated A. E. Snider, treasurer of the Association, at the Annual meeting of the Halton Branch held in Milton last week. While this is 1,117 less than in the previous year, the number of breedings for Halton, Ontario, Peel, Muskoka, and Parry Sound all showed increases over those in 1953. Notwithstanding the fact that no government grant was received in 1954, the association ended up with a profit of \$4,406 on the year. Dr. D. C. McKay, chief technician, in his interesting address dealt with some of the problems being encountered and the extent in which research is solving those problems. Agricultural Representative J. E. Whitelock presided for the election of Halton directors to the Maple Board. Edwin Harrop and F. G. Stark were re-elected.

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
