

Achievement Day Shows Skill of Homemakers

"The Supper Club," latest project under study by Halton 4-H Homemaking Clubs, came to a successful conclusion on Saturday, March 19th, at the Milton Town Hall, when the annual Achievement Day was held, under the direction of County Home Economist, Mrs. Mabel Borgstrom.

From eleven clubs in the county came seventy-eight girls to practice and demonstrate the skills they have acquired during the past few months. The Supper Club is a feature of "The Supper Club" and each member exhibited a plate of tea biscuits, which she had made. Also exhibited was her record book, which contained a report of club instruction and activities throughout this course of study. Other important features of the morning programme were Menu Judging, Menu Building, and the judging of a class of Tea Biscuits, with every girl participating.

Featured in the afternoon program were exhibits and demonstrations prepared by the clubs. Lowville, Norval, and Stewarttown clubs all chose the subjects "Ways of Serving Fruit" for their exhibits and comments on these were given by Dawn Coulter, Marilyn Cleave, and Gail Smith respectively. Hornby and Nelson Clubs exhibited "Salads" commented on by Martha May and Joan McKay. "Table Setting and Service for the Farm Family," was presented in skit form by Scotch Hock, and as a demonstration by club members from Haddockburn and Omagh. Juniors Dorothy Kilpatrick and Patsy Crawford of Limehouse, ably but amusingly demonstrated "Let's Make Tea Biscuits," while Ashgrove and Ballinafad clubs entertained and instructed the audience with skits on "Food Makes a Difference."

Helpful criticism and suggestions on exhibits, demonstrations and skits were given by assisting Home Economics, Mrs. Jessie Coles from Lincoln County, and Mrs. Agnes King from Wentworth, Waterloo and Brant.

J. E. Whitlock, agricultural representative for Halton county brought greetings and presented each girl with a 4-H Homemaking Club crest. Greetings were brought from the Women's Institutes of the County, by Mrs. Max Featherstone, District president.

At the close of the programme each club member completing the project received a silver spoon. Certificates of achievement were presented for each two projects completed, county honours for six projects, and provincial honours for twelve. Those receiving county honours on Saturday were: Marjorie McDonald and Mrs. Alice Wilkinson of Bannockburn; Arlene McArthur of Lowville; Helen Brucker, Martha May and Audrey Peacock of Hornby; and Mary Pope of the Omagh Club. Provincial honours were awarded Ruth Featherstone, of Nelson.

The next project undertaken by the 4-H Homemaking Clubs in Halton will be "Gardens" and the Training School for leaders of these clubs will be held in the Dept. of Agriculture Board Room, on Tuesday, March 29th. Beginning in the fall, a clothing unit, "What shall I wear," will be the course of study.

Members and leaders of the Homemaking Clubs for the past season will enjoy a sight-seeing trip to Kitchener, during the Easter vacation, taking in several local industries as well as such points of interest as Mr. Mackenzie King's boyhood home, the Pioneer Monument at Doon, and the West Montrose covered bridge.

4-H Homemaking Clubs are sponsored by the Women's Institute Branch and Home Economics Service of the Dept. of Agriculture, and are open to all rural girls between the ages of 12 and 26. Inquiries regarding the work are welcomed by the County home economist, or agricultural representative.

See you Friday night in your Lonesome Polecat suits.

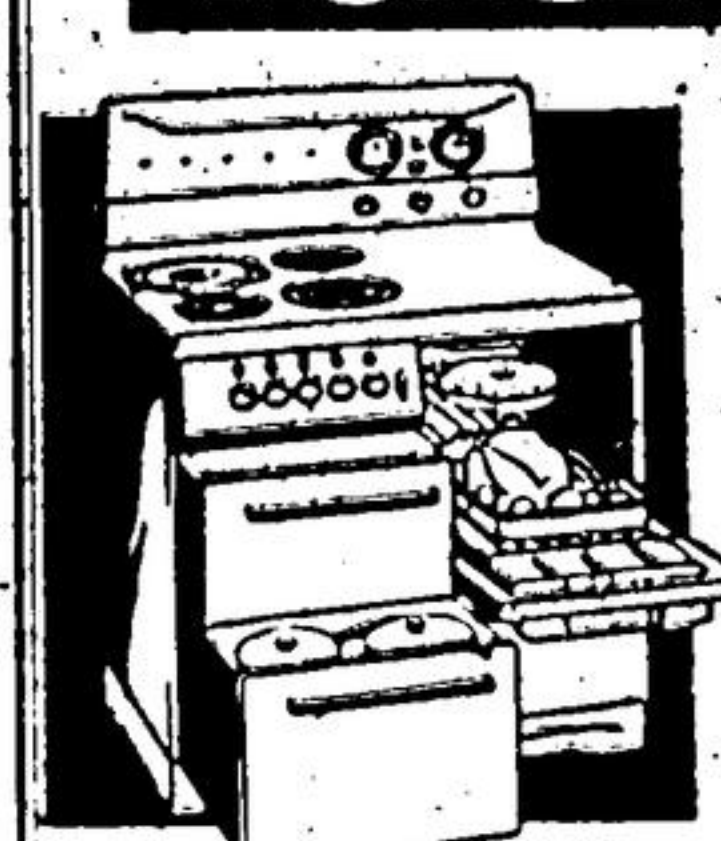
Conception and of the Resurrection as a penetration by God into his own natural laws and explained this as God's omnipotence in his own created world.

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New Booklet Prepared For Jehovah Witnesses

A spokesman for Jehovah's Witnesses has announced plans for delivering a special message to the world.

Mr. A. George, presiding minister of the Georgetown congregation revealed some of the details of this special campaign, which includes sponsoring the public lecture entitled "Christendom or Christianity" - which One Is the Light of the World? All congregations of Jehovah's Witnesses throughout the world (there are approximately 14,000 in 150 lands) will participate. Mr. George will deliver this discourse locally at the local Kingdom Hall, 45 Main Street in Georgetown.

After the discourse a new 32-page booklet containing extraordinary information will be given free to each person in attendance. Some 600,000 of Jehovah's Witnesses will then begin distribution of millions of copies of this special message in many languages throughout the world. It is the desire of Jehovah's Witnesses to place a copy in every home. Mr. George said the contents of this specially prepared booklet had not yet been made public, but its message was unique and would be of special interest to persons of all faiths.

Advance preparation and the world-wide scope of this special campaign give indication that this may well be one of the greatest religious proclamations in modern history, Mr. George said. He went on to tell of local plans that have been made, stating that Jehovah's Witnesses here are ready and eagerly look forward to this special campaign.
