WHAT COUNCIL DID

Two Companies Seek Natural Gas Franchise

Possibility of Georgetown being supplied with natural gas in future was revealed Monday when two requests for such franchises were received by council.

Anthony Gas and Oil Explorations, a company headed by Tony Szymuk of Acton reported two completed gas wells on property in the Scotch Block with a combined daily flow of 300,000 cubic feet. The company has an objective of another fifty wells before the end of this year.

A letter from Union Gas Co., Ltd., with headquarters at Chatham, conveyed a similar request for the future when they expect the gas would be supplied from the Trans-Canada pipeline from Alberta.

Council has asked Consumers Gas, which is now supplying Brampton, to discuss the question at a future Council meeting.

WHAT COUNCIL DID

Extra School Grant To Reduce Tax Rate

A bonanza of \$2028, received as an unexpected grant for education in 1965, has been turned back to the town in the form of a reduction in grant to the public school board.

The board informed council Monday that they are reducing their requisition of tax funds by this amount, though it is difficult to promise that the budget can be adhered to if any mushroom growth boosts school enrolment beyond present expectations in September.

The extra grant of \$4.00 for each public school child was announced last week by Premier Leslie Frost as a special aid for education.

A request by Mrs. Maurice Hillcock to purchase Charity Lane, an unopened road allowance beside her property on Queen Street was turned down as council deemed it unwise to close a future entrance into possible park land in the river flats.

A similar request from Harold O'Brien, asking to purchase a road allowance beside his home on Maple Avenue E. was delayed for further consideration. Mr. O'Brien asked permission to either buy or clean up the property, and also asked the town to put up "dead-end" signs to stop traffic from using his driveway as a turn-off point.
