WHAT COUNCIL DID Extra School Grant To Reduce Tax Rate

A bonanza of \$2028, received as an unexpected grant for education in 1955, has been turned back to the town in the form of a reduction in grant to the public school board.

The board informed council Monday that they are reducing their requisition of tax funds by this amount, though it is difficult to promise that the budget can be adhered to if any mushroom growth boosts school enrolment beyond present expectations in September.

The extra grant of \$4.00 for each public school child was announced last week by Premier Leslie Frost as a special aid for education.
