North Halton high school board is seeking a replacement for Miss Dorothy Parkinson, who is being married this summer and will be moving to another community.

At last week's board meeting, Miss Parkinson's resignation was accepted, as well as one from Mr. Ringle of the Aetna staff.

Miss Parkinson joined the Georgetown school staff two years ago after graduation from the University of Toronto and the Ontario College of Education.

The school board is busy with plans for additions on the Aetna and Milton schools. Tenders have already been called for a 3 room addition at Aetna. Architects Barrett & Ripper are at work on plans for a 2-room Milton addition, which will be submitted to the board later this month.

The meeting was held in Georgetown with chairman William Cooen presiding. The secretary, with Georgetown board members Dr. J. B. Milne, Fred Masterman and Ernest Forgrave will confer with planning consultant Dr. Paludi regarding land set aside in the Delrex subdivision for a possible future high school.

Approval was given for erecting a wire fence coating \$1400 around part of the Aetna school property. Letters from the leaders of night school classes held in the three towns expressed appreciation for board cooperation and a hope that these classes could be continued next year.

Atomic Power For Better Living



An artist's drawing of the first nuclear reactor to be put to work by private industry for improving a wide range of consumer products.

The first nuclear reactor to be owned and operated by private industry to produce atomic energy for peaceful, civilian purposes, has been designed and is planned for construction.

The American Machine & Foundry Company will build the reactor at an estimated cost of \$1,500,000. It will be used to develop different and better foods, medicines, textiles, plastics and other consumer goods.

General Walter Bedell Smith,

vice chairman of the board of the company, predicted that the harnessing of atomic energy to the needs of American industry will greatly aid in research and in the production of countless necessities to daily living.

The new plant, to be located on a 250-acre site in New York State, is planned as the first of a number of atomic reactors for industry throughout the country. Representative companies from each industry will use the reactor jointly.
