### Theatre Manager Attends Buffalo Conference

Bill Leslie, manager of the Roxy Theatre, was the guest of Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer pictures at that company's "ticket selling workshop," a one day meeting of leading theatre men at the Statler Hotel, Buffalo, on Monday.

Mr. Leslie was invited to the meeting by MGM in recognition by the company of his alert showmanship which has been evidenced by his bringing to Georgetown the very first and latest of Hollywood's motion picture entertainment. He stated on his return from the meeting that there is every reason for the public to expect even more fine pictures in the coming season and he is convinced that theatre attendance will continue to rise as these pictures come to the Roxy.

George Murphy, the film star, gave an address that was fully appreciated by all. The meeting in Buffalo was called primarily by MGM to convey to theatre owners and managers, ideas for attracting greater patronage at their box offices as it is the belief of the motion picture industry's best advertising and publicity men that people are becoming increasingly aware of the efforts being made in Hollywood to introduce better attractions via the many new screen techniques including wide screen, CinemaScope, VistaVision, stereophonic sound, etc., and that if the local theatreman plans his advertising campaigns to take advantage of this public alertness to the new pictures, he will benefit at the box office as well as guarantee that his patrons will not miss any of the attractions for which they have developed what the trade calls "want to see." On his return, Mr. Leslie announced that the following forthcoming attractions have been booked for future showing on the screen at the Roxy Theatre: "Ma & Pa Kettle at Winkie"; "Gone With the Wind"; "The Vanishing Prairie"; "We Want a Child"; "They Were So Young"; "Julius Caesar" and "The Bridges of Toko Ri."
