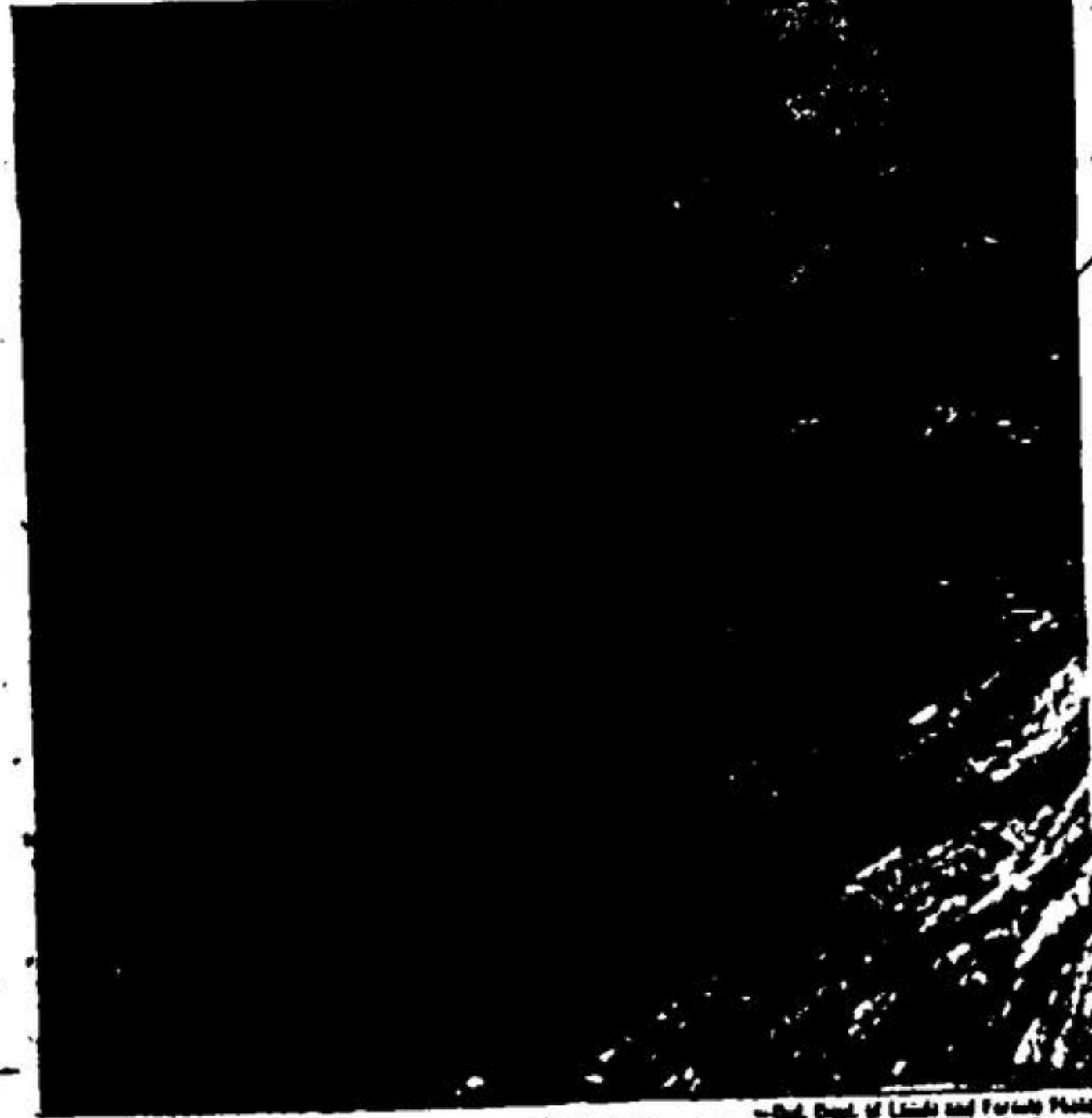

DR. BLATZ WILL SPEAK AT CHILDREN'S AID

Dr. William E. Blatz, eminent Canadian child psychologist and director of the Institute of Child Study, University of Toronto, will address the annual meeting of the Halton County Children's Aid Society on Thursday evening, April 21st, in the Sunday School room of St. Paul's United Church, Milton. W. G. McKenzie Robinson, Oakville, president of the 41 year old Society, has invited all interested citizens to attend.

Dr. Blatz, author of many books notably "Understanding the Young Child," is internationally known for his work in child development. During World War II he organized and directed the Garrison Lane Nursery Training Centre in Birmingham, Michigan. Dr. Blatz is consultant to the Toronto Family and Juvenile Court. New by-laws have been prepared for approval at the annual meeting, the result of a change in provincial legislation last January when the Society came under the new Child Welfare Act, 1954.

The Halton County Children's Aid Society, one of the oldest in Ontario, was organized in 1914. G. F. Thompson, director and superintendent, who has served the society continuously for 26 years, is the longest serving superintendent in the province. The Society reported 115 children under care last December. It does not operate a shelter and children are placed in homes in order that they may participate fully in family life and in the community.

The union seeks to be bargaining agent for Acton's new industry, S. G. Smallwood Co., an electrical parts firm employing some 80 persons.

Mayor Ted Tyler, who had majority council support, and other councillors were liberally quoted in a Globe and Mail story this morning.

Future hiring of the town hall was left to town clerk J. M. McGeachie and an affirmative vote of 5 of the 9 councillors said "at this time the hall shall not be let to the union."
