

## Liberals Choose Anderson As Provincial Party Candidate

William Anderson, former reeve of Oakville, and a man who has been in public life for many years in Halton County, was the choice of Halton Liberals at a convention held in Trafalgar Hall last Wednesday. He promised the 150 delegates present at the meeting that he would carry on a hard-fought campaign not only to win Halton for the Liberals but to oust the Frost government from power in the next provincial election.

Three men were nominated: John Hutecheon, a young farmer 28 years of age who was born and raised in Halton; Mr. Anderson and Ken Giles of Trafalgar. Mr. Giles withdrew from the election and on the first ballot Mr. Anderson was chosen.

While the ballots were being counted, W. J. L. Hampshire and Hughes Cleaver, briefly addressed the audience. Both have been prominent in county affairs for many years and Mr. Cleaver was the former Liberal federal member.

Hon. Farquhar Oliver, leader of the Liberal party in Ontario, gave the

audience a resume of the present government. He scathingly denounced them for their inaction and the actions of which they had bungled. He criticized the Frost government on their treatment of the municipalities; their Hydro extravagance and increased power costs; their inadequate health and welfare program; and their flouting of all democratic principles when the Highway scandals were unearthed. He promised the presentation of a sound Liberal platform to meet Ontario's needs when the election was announced for June.

Frank Petch of Georgetown, president of the Halton Liberal Association, presided at the meeting and A. R. Davis of Oakville was in charge of elections.

### Mrs. David Sovereign Many Relatives Here

Mrs. David F. Sovereign, 73, who was buried in Burlington last Thursday was a native of the Georgetown-Erin district and member of a family intimately linked with Georgetown's history.

Formerly Annie B. Burt, she was the daughter of J. W. and Janet McKinnon Burt and born at Coningsby. Since their marriage Mr. and Mrs. Sovereign had lived at Freeman where he operates a fruit farm and market garden.

Mrs. Burt had been ill since last August. She died in the Nora Frances Henderson Hospital, Hamilton, on April 11th. Last June 1st, Mr. and Mrs. Sovereign celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary.

Surviving are her husband and four children, Leota, and Earl of Freeman, Evelyn, Mrs. Frank Young of Toronto, and Doris, Mrs. Charles Speck, Hornby. There are also eleven grandchildren. A son, Lieut. Burt Sovereign, was killed in action in Belgium in World War 2.

Three brothers and a sister also survive, Mrs. P. G. Cole, Appelh, Chester and Goldwin of Erin, and Clifford of Georgetown. She was preceded by a brother and sister, Lawrence Burt and Mrs. D. J. Sinclair, both of Georgetown district.

At the funeral, three grandsons and three nephews acted as pallbearers. Grandsons were David Sovereign, Robert Ecclestone and William Speck, and nephews George Burt, Garnet Sinclair and Gordon Sovereign.

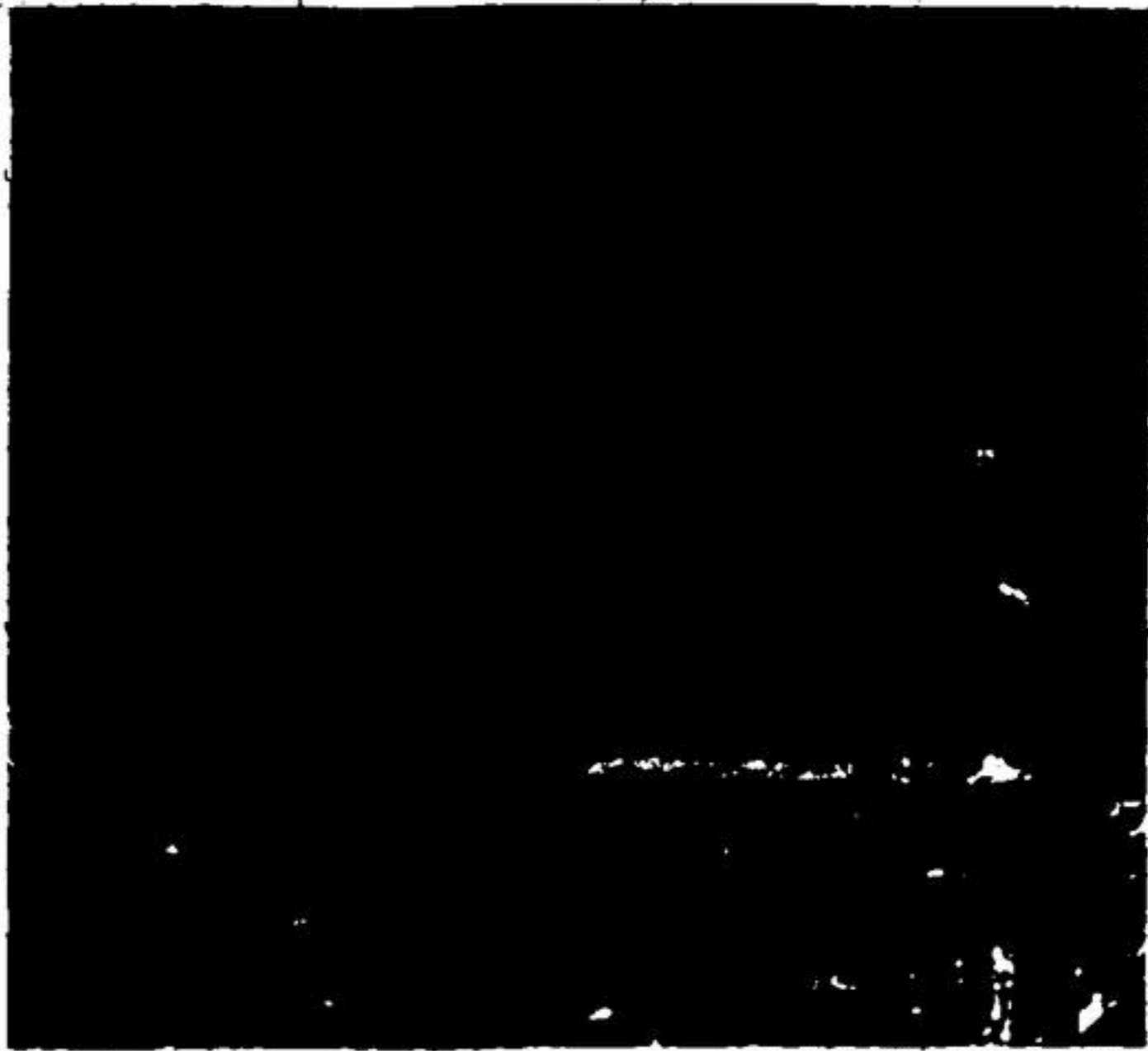

### Blue Goose Flyers ORHA Senior Champs

Blue Goose Flyers are the winners of the Ontario Rural Hockey Association Senior Championship and the Lorne Johannes trophy following a series in which they downed Chippawa four games to two, roundly defeated Rockford in two games before that team dropped out, and then last week eliminated West Lorne by three games to one. Suspense mounted until the final game April 12th in Georgetown when the Flyers proved their supremacy on the ice with a resounding 15 to 3 victory.

It was a fast game and considered not as one-sided as the score would indicate.

Milton took a three goal lead in the first period and were never threatened after this. The second period saw them lunge ahead and put five more while West Lorne netted two. The third period saw Milton showing championship form as they pressed for seven goals and held West Lorne to one.

The game was not as rough as the last one with only nine penalties being handed out, all minor ones. Six of these went to Milton and the remainder to West Lorne.

This is the third year the boys have tried for this championship. The first year they went to the semifinals to be beaten out by Bright last year, the went on to the finals to be beaten only by Markham, who this year turned OHA Intermediate. This year, with the best team they ever had, the Flyers pressed on and brought the championship back to Milton. It was last won by the P. L. Robertson entry in 1941-42.

This does not mean the end of hockey for the Flyers. They will play off with the ORHA Intermediate A winners for an All Ontario pennant. This year in Intermediate, Peter's Corners and Ayr are playing the finals. The winner of the Int. C - Int. B series will then play the winner of the Milton series for the Charles E. Downing trophy.

In the series just concluded, the Flyers scored 35 goals to West Lorne's 16 in four games and 29 to Rockford's six in two meetings. The Flyers counted 35 goals to Chippawa's 31. Total for the playdown series was 99 goals to 53 — a sizeable margin.
