the next provincial election. Three men were nominated: John Hutcheon, a young farmer 28 years of age, who was born and raised in Maiton; Mr. Anderson and Ken Giles of Trafalgar. Mr. Giles withdrew from the election and on the first ballot Mr.

Anderson was chosen. While the ballots were being counted, W. J. L. Hampshire and Hughes Cleaver briefly addressed the audience. Both have been prominent in county affairs for many years and Mr. Cleaver was the former Liberal federal member.

Hon. Parquhar Oliver, leader of the Liberal party in Ontarfo, gave the

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
