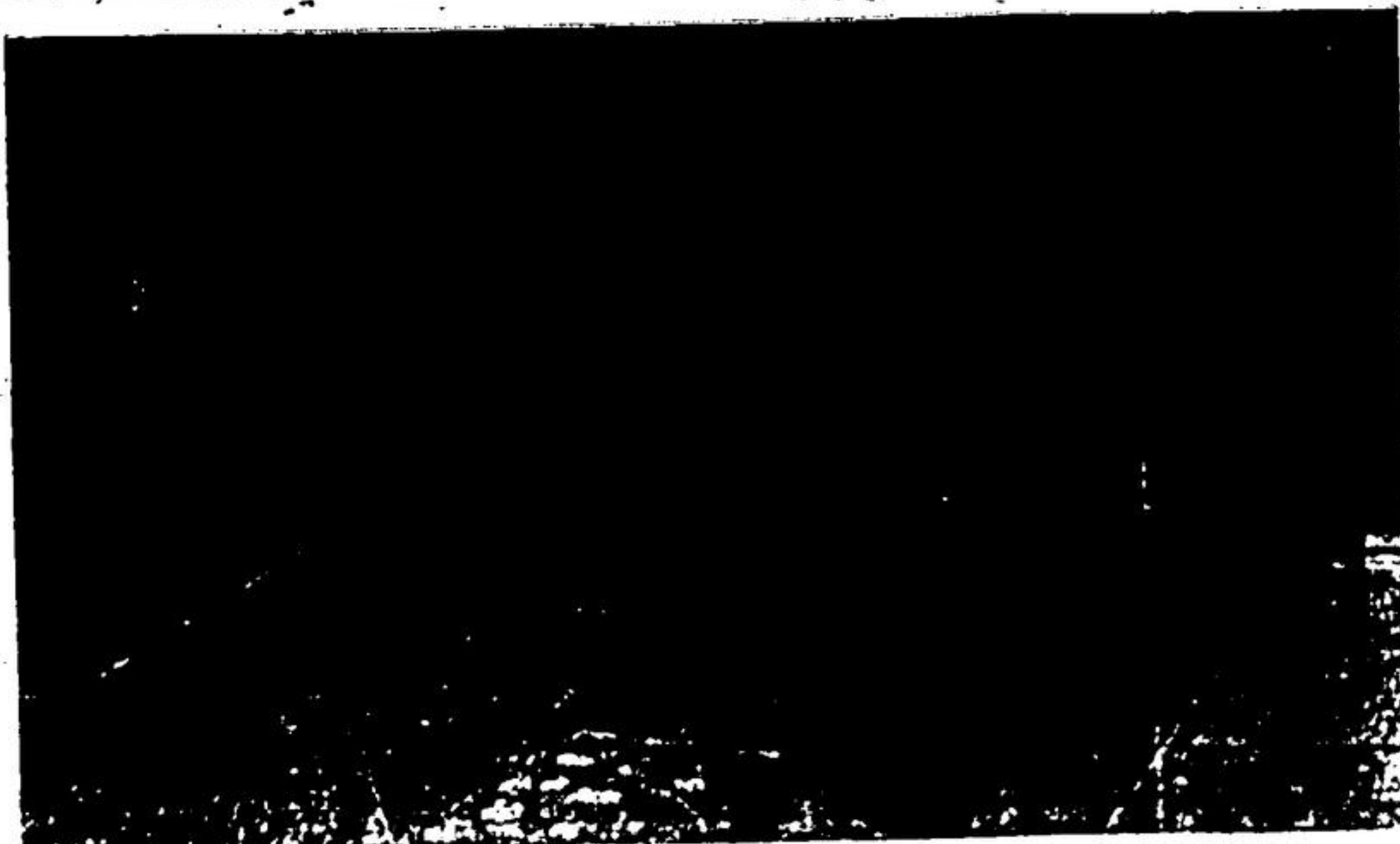

All Modern Features New Hydro Truck

The bright red truck you see parked downtown and in use in various districts of Georgetown has nothing to do with the fire department.

It is the new hydro construction truck and superintendent G. W. McCallum was beaming when he parked it in front of the office one day last week to show the editor all the features.

The GMC truck has the latest in equipment and modern improvements to make work easier and more efficient for the hydro crew. One particularly handy idea is a mirror mounted above the driver, so he can direct operations from his seat in the cab. A folding "cabscope" or metal canopy works like an accordion and moves out of position when the truck is in use.

Daylight Saving Time

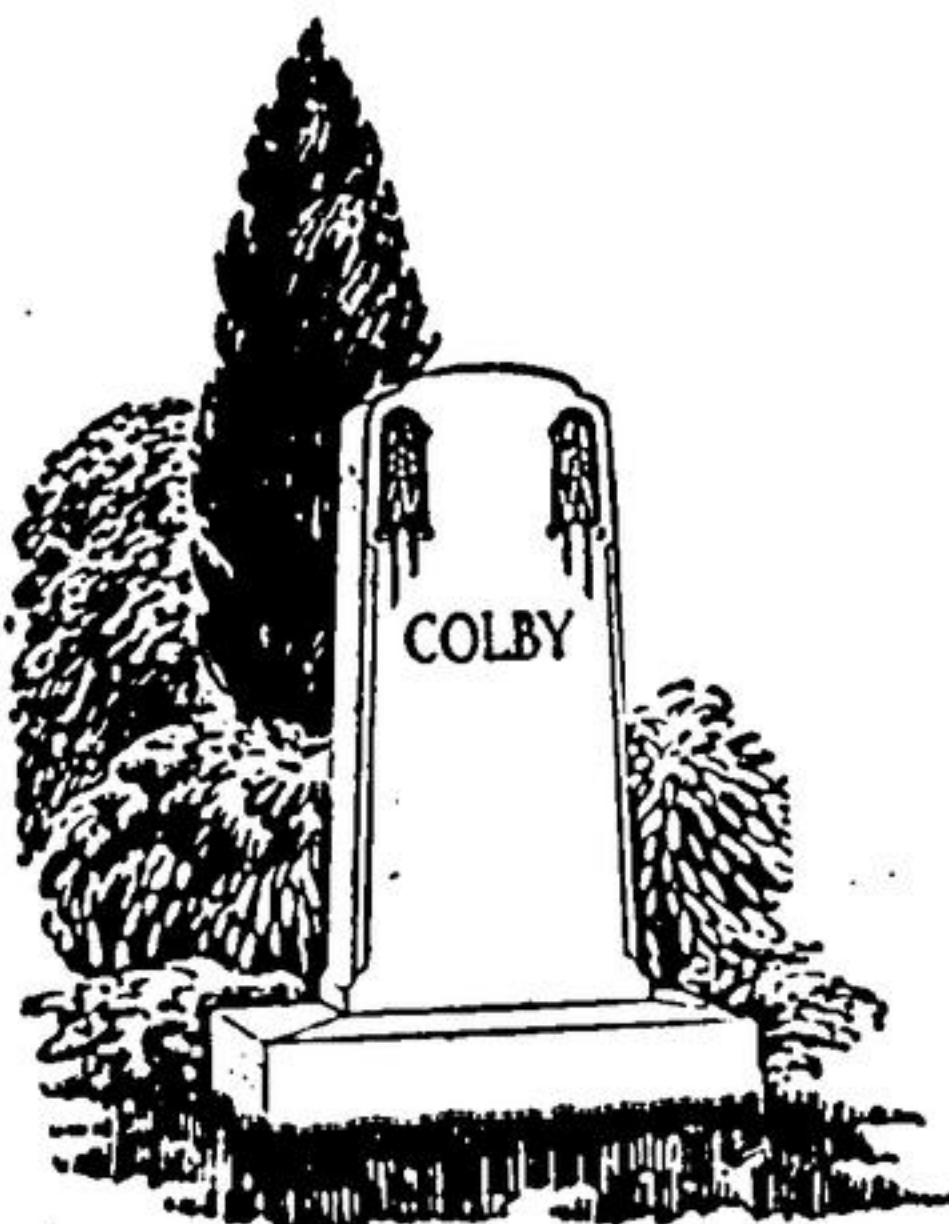
