**Credit Valley Conservation  
 Authority Holds Meeting**

The fifth meeting of the Credit Valley Conservation Authority was held in the Municipal Chambers of the village of Port Credit, in Clarke Hall, on Wednesday, March 30th. On call to order by chairman D. J. Reddington, the secretary called the roll. The following members were in attendance:

Miss M. S. Castle, Toronto Twp.; E. Blair, Chinguacousy Twp.; W. M. Curry, Orangeville; A. M. Greenaway, Port Credit; Alex Maclaren, Georgetown; J. J. Page, Streetsville; R. R. Parker, Acton; D. J. Reddington, Toronto Twp.; Campbell Sinclair, Esqueping Twp.; P. J. Sinclair, Erin Village; Albert Wheeler, Erin Township; Eric M. White, Mono Twp.; W. E. Wright, secretary-treasurer; H. F. Osawn, representing the chief officer.

The following visitors were present:

E. Munro, Parkland Avenue, Lorne Park; S. Bradley, Deputy reeve, Port Credit; H. Miller, Port Credit, Parks and Recreation Advisory Board; E. Flemming, Toronto Twp. Recreation Commission; W. Hare, Director of Recreation, Toronto Twp.; W. Lealie, Georgetown, Advisory Board on Public Relations; Dr. Holling, Parkland Ave., Lorne Park; Prof. A. V. Coventry, Streetsville, Parks and Recreation Advisory Board; Murray Young, Orangeville, Advisory Board on Reforestation; Lyle Campbell, Town Engineer, Orangeville; Councillor Holland, Port Credit.

The chairman extended an invitation to visitors to speak to the Authority. Mr. Flemming spoke of the desire of the Recreation Commission of the Township of Toronto to have the closest cooperation with the Authority. He pointed out that the Commission, which is responsible for the parks and recreation in Toronto township, has had very close cooperation with the South Peel Board of Education with the result that parks and school grounds are frequently adjacent to each other. Joint use is possible, eliminating overlapping and waste of public funds. He expressed a hope that the Authority might become a third body to cooperate.

A letter was read from the Toronto Township Hydro Commission outlining

ing its relationship to the Erindale Dam and basin, and requesting cooperation from the Authority.

**Construction on Flood Lands**  
 A letter was read from the Recreation Commission which urged action to prevent construction on flood lands, and that prompt action be taken to establish a policy regarding parks, green belt and recreation. It suggested that the South Peel Board of Education be included in any study of these matters.

It was agreed that the chairman of the Flood Control Advisory Board and the chairman of the Parks and Recreation Advisory Board meet the representatives of the Recreation Commission on Monday, March 4th, at 8 p.m. at Miss Castle's home at Meadowvale.

Dr. Holling spoke on the need to prevent further destruction of trees.

**Tree Destruction.**  
 Mr. Murray Young questioned the wisdom of permitting tree destruction on the one hand and expending public funds, on the other, to remedy the condition caused by wanton destruction of trees. When it was suggested that the court had difficulty in determining whether the trees destroyed had been healthy or not, Mr. Young suggested that the report of the inspector should be acceptable and conclusive.

With respect to the recommendation of the Advisory Board that the 100 acres adjoining the property containing the pond which the Authority has considered acquiring be, itself, acquired for a sum not to exceed seven thousand dollars, it was agreed that Mr. Curry would confer with the chief officer and report back at the next meeting.

**Conserves Wooded Areas**  
 A letter was read from the township of Toronto Ratepayers Association urging the Authority to take prompt action in the conservation of wooded areas and watercourses.

With respect to the prevention of the destruction of trees, the following resolution was adopted:

That the Authority request the Peel County Reforestation Committee to endeavour to restrict tree removal until the report of the survey of the Watershed is complete and the Authority policy has been established. Carried.

With respect to the retention of greenbelts, protection of the slopes and crest of the river valley and the building of structures below flood line on all water-courses within the area of the Credit Valley Conservation Authority, the following resolution was adopted:

**No Subdivisions on River Bank**  
 That this authority request the Planning Boards of all municipalities adjacent to the Credit river, to approve of any subdivision along the banks of the Credit River until the various Planning Boards and Councils consult with the Authority as required by Section 300 of the Municipal Act and that the secretary so advise all the municipal planning boards and councils within this Authority. Carried.

A letter was read from Mr. Richardson enclosing a plan of the Huttonville area.

Mr. Crown assured the Authority that acquisition of the dam would not interfere with the over-all development of a conservation program.

Moved by R. R. Parker, seconded by a Maclaren.

That the Flood Control Advisory Board be authorized to obtain a complete engineering study and determine cost of repairs to the Huttonville dam to a point which would permit the calling for tenders; and to ascertain the cost of the property from Mr. McMurchy; and to obtain an option thereon. Carried.

The secretary-treasurer reported that he had not submitted any account to any municipality for the 1955 levy based on the total amount determined at the January meeting, as the proportions to each municipality would be different to 1954 because of changed populations and increased areas now included.

A basis suggested by the chief officer was discussed by the members.

**1955 Levies**  
 Moved by A. M. Greenaway, seconded by E. S. Blair.

That the levy for the various municipalities in the Authority, as prepared by the Department, be approved and the secretary be authorized to bill each member municipality and that the minimum levy on any municipality be \$25.00.
