POLIO VACCINE NOW FOR THIRD GRADERS

With announcement of the success of the Salk polio vaccine and statement by Premier Leslie Frost that all Ontario school children will receive it as soon as possible, arrangements have been made by Halton Health Unit for Grade 3 children in the county.

They will receive their first injection of vaccine during the second week of May, and the second injection possibly four weeks later, about the week of June 13th. Some 1300 children will be eligible for this

When Dr. Jonas Salk, in his public statement, revealed that two injections would be sufficient, with a reinforcing dose several months later, the provincial department of health changed plans Pupils in Grade 1 and 2 have already received these two injections, and the third inoculation will now be postponed for at least seven months.

Time and place of clinics will be announced later.

Georgetown, Milton Clubs Visit Forestry Stations

On Saturday, April 16th, seventeen members of the Georgetown and Milton 4-H Forestry Clubs visited the Provincial Forestry Station at St. Williams. There they saw the many steps

in the production of young trees. These included the newly laid out seed beds; the beds of two year old stock ready for transplanting; the lifting and transplanting machines; and finally the beds of four year old trees which will be shipped this spring to all parts of the province for re-

forestation purposes. The trip was organized by zone forester C. R. Groves, with the assistance of club leaders Blair Armstrong of the Georgetown High School, and C. Wilson of the Milton High School. Transportation was provided by Art Bennett, Associate Agricultural Representative for Halton and Peel Countres, and by Art Vivian and George Dennis of the Kingsway Kiwanis, which organization is sponsoring the two 4-H Forestry Clubs in Halton.



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
