#### Synthetic Conditioners Don't Increase Yields

These on the bus trip to Western Ontario and Michigan in 1953, which was sponsored by the Halton Soil and Crop Improvement Association. will recall the visit to the Woodslee Experimental Substation in Essex County.

They will also recall the heavy soils, and that on some of the plots treated with soil conditioners there was a marked improvement in the general tilth and friebility of the

It will therefore be of interest to learn that according to a release made by the Canada Department of Agriculture, synthetil oil condition ers were not effective in Increasing torn or soybean yields. The report further points out that one of the synthetic materials used effectively loosened the soil, providing better soil seration, better movement of water through the soil, and improvement in granular structure.

Earlier work reported by experiment stations in the U.S. has indicated that soil conditioning materials brought about spectacular yield increases of many crops. However on The strength of the work at Woodslee, E. F. Bolton, Soils Specialist, states "Soil conditioners can not be recommended for use with field crops in southwestern Ontario."






