

NEW DEPARTMENT HEAD APPOINTED AT OAC

Dr. W. E. Heming, who for the past two years has been professor of entomology and zoology in the Dept. of Entomology and Zoology, OAC, has been appointed head of the department, Dr. J. D. MacLachlan, OAC president, announced today. Dr. Heming succeeds Prof. A. W. Baker, whose retirement from the post becomes effective May 1st

A native of Owen Sound, Ontario, Dr. Heming attended public and high schools there, and graduated from the OAC in 1929. Following graduation he was with the entomology laboratory of the Canada Dept. of Agriculture at Chatham. In the fall of that year he joined the staff of the Dept. of Entomology and Zoology, OAC, as lecturer, leaving in 1934 for graduate study at Cornell University, from which he graduated in 1939 with his Doctor's

In 1940 he was appointed assistant professor at Whittier College, Whittier, California, and rose in the department to become professor in 1946. During this period he was active in a number of research projects for the United States Dept. of Agriculture.

In 1949 he returned to the OAC as associate professor in the Dept. of Entomology and Zoology, becoming professor in 1963. He is chairman of the Legume Re-

search committee at the OAC. Dr. Heming is a member of the Entomological Societies of America, Canada, and. Ontario (serving the latter group as editor of the Annual Report of that organization. He is also a member of the American Assoc. for the Advancement of Science, and
