WHAT COUNCIL DID

Private Hospital May Locate in Georgetown

Georgetown may have a private hospital this year if present plans work out.
At Monday's council meeting, real estate agent Al Sykes asked council to indicate the town's willingness for such a hospital. His client, a registered nurse, presently operating a hospital in another Ontario town, would move this to Georgetown if council is agreeable.
Mr. Sykes said that two local doctors favour the plan and one of these has viewed the present hospital and indicated approval of its equipment and operation.
The hospital would be limited to maternity and accident cases, probably an 8-bed one, and would, Mr. Sykes feels, fill a real need in a town where all hospitalization is in neighbouring centres.
Council will investigate and pre-arrange Mr. Sykes an answer next Monday night.
A \$200 grant was made to supply fireworks for a community celebration in the park on May 23rd. This will be matched by a similar donation from the Canadian Legion, to supply an evening similar to last year. With Cr. Doug Sargent complaining

about real estate signs erected on town property in the eastern part of town without permission, council will ask the building inspector to check on these and remind offenders that unauthorized signs cannot be allowed.
Complaint by the fire department that compensation payments to two injured firemen had been delayed several weeks, prompted council to write the Workmen's Compensation Board for an explanation.

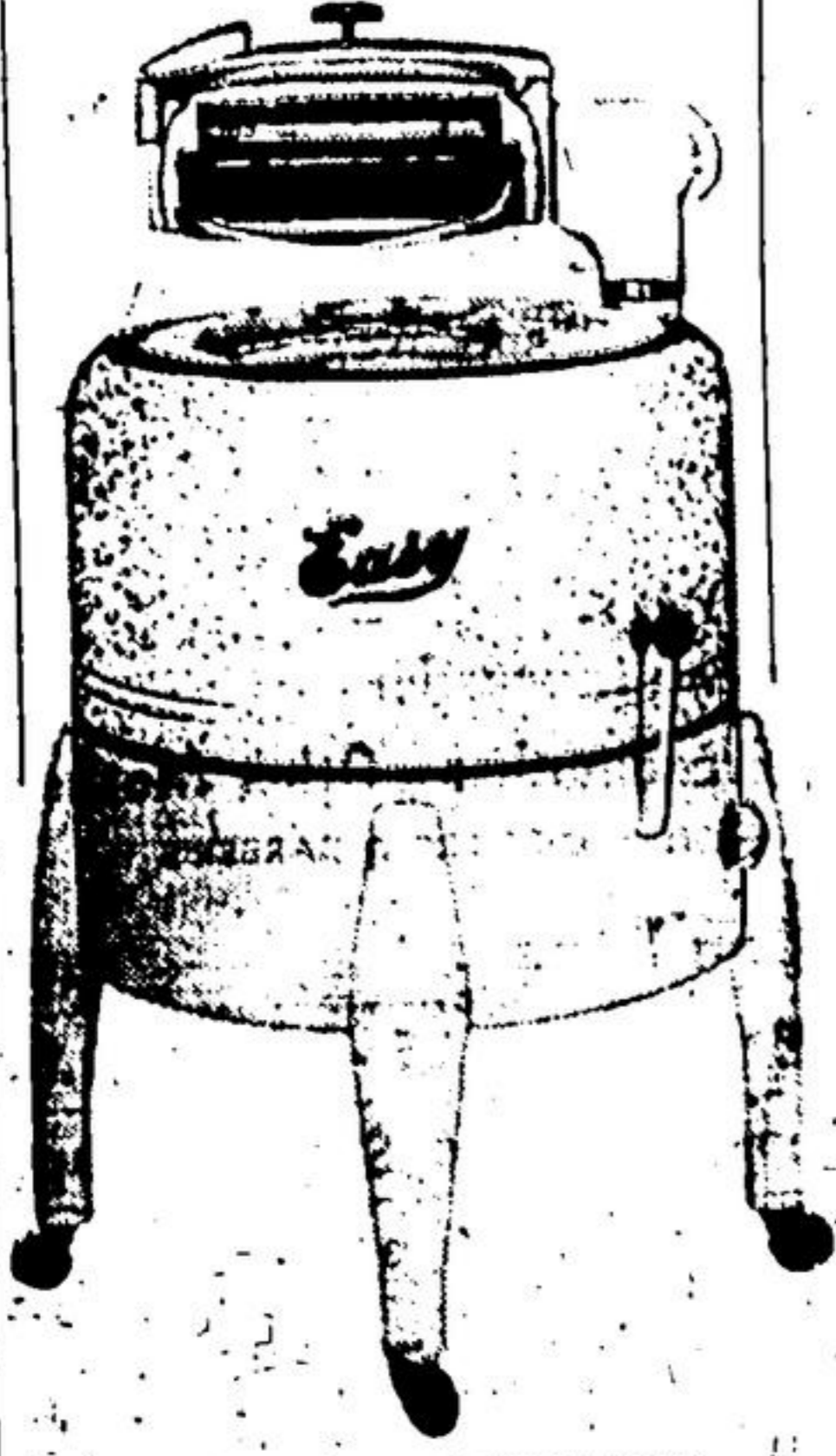
