CHAMBER RECOMMENDS PARKING CONTROLS

A motion was passed, at the Cham-
ber of Commerce meeting last Thurs-
day night, to send a letter to Coun-
cil, pointing out the traffic hazard
of "blind spots" at the Main Street
intersection and the corner of No. 7
highway and Water Street. In the
letter the Chamber recommended
that parking restrictions be imposed
in these areas.

A committee has been appointed to
look into the possibility of the pur-
chase of land suitable for a downtown
parking lot.

It was decided to hold a special
meeting in the near future to dis-
cuss the possibility of establishment
of a hospital here. The trend of op-
inion registered from plebeians in the
various organizations in town is
favourable to the idea.

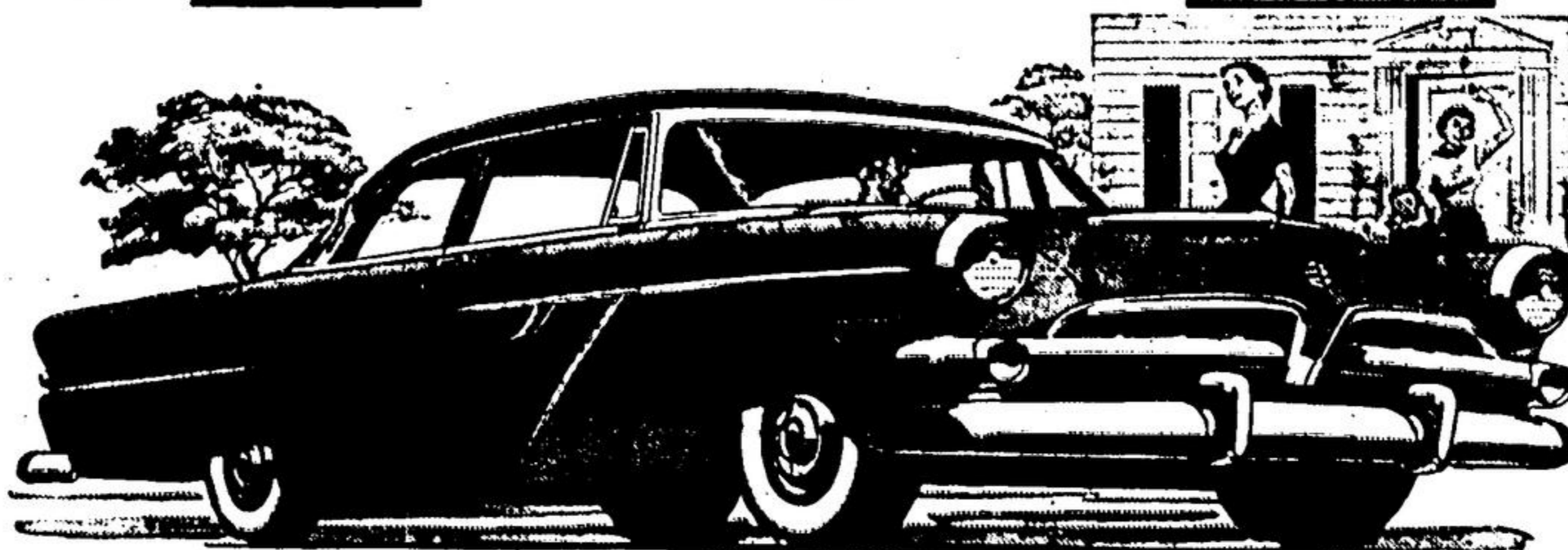
