Beer Holstein Produces  
Third Butterfat Record

An ROP record of 26,328 lbs. milk containing 835 lbs. butterfat has recently been completed by a pure bred Holstein owned by Thomas Beer, of Georgetown. She is Huntshaven Supreme Pabst and her record was made as a seven year old in the 365 day di-

vision on twice a day milking. This record was the largest for milk and the third largest for butterfat completed by any one of the 264 animals that qualified last month in this class.

Huntshaven Supreme Pabst is classified as Very Good in Selective Registration, the second highest rating at a time for conformation listed by Hunt Bros. of Tweed, she was sired by Roseath Supreme Commander (xx) and is from a Very Good dam. She is now in the Red Seal class with 102,050 lbs. milk and 3,476 lbs. but-  
terfat in five lactations.

Other cows in the Beer herd have also fine records. These include Posch Acme Daisy (GP), 7 yrs., 2X 125,084 lbs. milk, 4615 lbs. fat, Lidia Dakar, (GP), 8 yrs., 2x, 118,746 lbs. milk, 3852 lbs. fat, Rosser Alexandria Echo (VG), 7 yrs., 2x, 103,684 lbs. milk, 3891 lbs. fat.
