It was also the general feeling of the meeting that in the past far too many licenses have been sold to outside hunters by some Halton munici-

palities. It was therefore recommended to county council that in future, the licenses to non-residents of Halton to hunt foxes, rabbits and pheasants, be limited in number to the county, and that a meeting of township municipal officers be held prior to July 1st. when details concerning the number of licenses to be sold, etc. would be decided.




