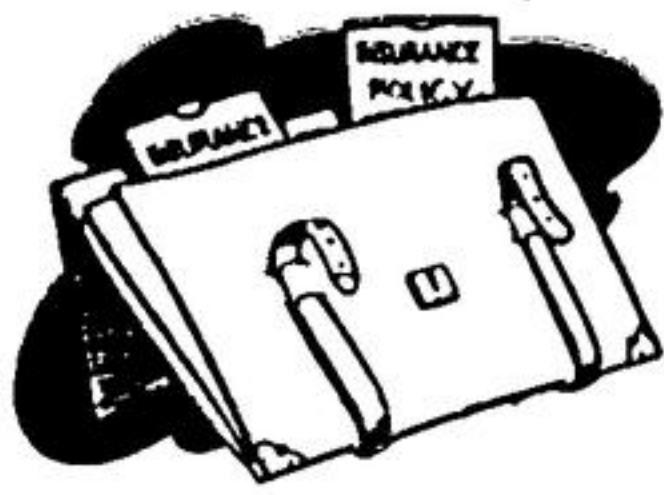

Chatting . . .

with M. H. B.

• **SOMETIMES**, when the youngsters are getting on a bit in years . . . say about six-ish, mum and dad like to sleep in an extra half hour on Sunday morning. And sometimes when they do, weird and wonderful things happen in the kitchen. One young mother we know came down stairs Sunday morning and her 7-year-old son proudly announced he had prepared breakfast for himself and his brother. The menu? . . . Reddi-Whip on toast . . . Methinks she has another Duncan Hines in the making. . . . But the years when the family are all together are happy ones to recall late on in life when the children grow up and go their separate ways. Then the years slip by at an alarming rate, with reunions seldom possible in many cases . . .

• **ONE VERY HAPPY** family reunion took place in Vancouver, B.C. a week ago Wednesday, when Mr. A. E. Dawson and his two sisters were together again after a separation of forty years. Travel by air, with the planes zooming half-way round the world in a few hours, made the happy occasion possible. . . . One sister, Mrs. Geoffrey Willan, flew from Sydney, Australia, to Vancouver, B.C., with only one stopover in Hawaii. When she arrived in Vancouver, her sister Mrs. Jim Reynolds had just arrived by plane from Los Angeles, California a short time before. At midnight the same night, their brother, Mr. A. E. Dawson, came in on the plane which had left Toronto that morning. And this reunion marked another anniversary in Mr. Dawson's life. It took place on the 50th anniversary of his arrival in Canada from England . . .

• **Mrs. Reynolds** has been living in Los Angeles for the past 40 years, and Mrs. Willan has lived in Australia for 40 years. . . . After their few hours together in Vancouver, Mrs. Reynolds returned to Los Angeles, and Mr. Dawson and Mrs. Willan took the plane for the East, stopping off to visit with son Donald Dawson and his family at Calgary, Alberta, and daughter Darryl and her family at Edmonton. They arrived home in Georgetown a week ago Sunday night, and Mrs. Willan will be visiting for a month with Mr. and Mrs. Dawson. . . . It is not the first visit to Canada for Mrs. Willan, however. She came out here from England in 1913, when for a short time she nursed at the Wellesley Hospital in Toronto. When war broke out, she returned to England, and after her marriage, went to live in Australia . . .

• **REMEMBERING THAT** Australia's seasons are just the opposite to ours, we inquired about the weather down there, and learned that right now they're having pretty much the same kind of weather that we're having here. The days are warm and the nights cool. But down there, it's autumn. And they have just had the hottest summer they have ever experienced. The temperature was a sweltering 100 in the shade for weeks on end. . . .

• **Living in the vicinity of Sydney,** Mrs. Willan says the temperature is never really cold, even in their winter months of July and August. That is why all the houses in that section of Australia are built in ranch style, with no central heating. When heat is required, it is supplied by fire places . . .

• **ONE THING** Mrs. Willan had missed since leaving home to live in Australia, is the long twilight we enjoy. A glance at a map will show you that Australia is much closer to the equator than we are, and so there is very little twilight at any time. When the sun dips below the horizon, darkness falls almost immediately . . .

• **The countryside around Sydney** is very fertile and growth is luxuriant. Most homes have gardens of their own where they grow such things as oranges, lemons and bananas . . . We feel quite proud of our own country side right now, however, with springtime fresh upon it, and we know that nowhere can it be appreciated more than in the countryside around Georgetown and Glen Williams.
