Township Natural Gas May Supply Georgetown

There is a very real possibility that Georgetown will some day be supplied with natural gas from wells located only four miles from town.

On farm property in the Scotch Block, Anthony Oil and Gas Exploration Ltd. is drilling 24 hours a day and claims positive proof of success. No. 3 well which came into production a week ago with an official test of 332,000 cubic feet a day, had such great pressure that the operation was stopped to make preparations to control the gas. Mr. A. Seynuk, Acton, who started the explorations, believes that here he will find oil in large quantities.

At the present time the company has five representatives calling on farmers to lease land for drilling rights. Territory involved reaches from both sides of the 6th Line, from Hornby to Acton Highway, and as far north as Fergus and west to Kitchener. Roy Macdonald, company representative, will call on farmers in southern part of township. Leases are for the

for gas and oil, but have nothing to do with quarry or mineral rights. Each farmer is given a small fee to legalize the transaction for three years. At the end of that time, if no drilling has been done, the company pays 25c per acre until the expiration of the 10-year lease.

The lease also states that all pipe lines will be put below plow depth. The company pays damages to roadways, crop damage beyond a radius of fifty feet from the centre of a well, and guarantees to meet any tax increase due to increased value of the farm. No drilling is done within 300 feet of any building except by permission of the farm owner.

The farm owner receives a royalty of 12 1/2% of all products from his wells. In the case of a successful well, this could amount to as much as \$10,000 a year, Mr. Seynuk states. Roy Macdonald, company representative, will call on farmers in southern part of township.
