\$1200 DAMAGE IN THREE-CAR SMASH

"Calamity corner" is the name Cr. Thomas Lyons applies half in jest, to the road intersection of Church and Edith Streets. His home being located on the corner, gave him a ring-side view of two accidents which have taken place there within the past couple of weeks.

About 3 in the afternoon last Wednesday, May 18th three cars driven by Miss Doreen Davidson, William Girdwood and Wray Bessey, were involved in a collision, resulting in property damage amounting to \$1200.

Miss Davidson was proceeding west on Church Street and Mr. Girdwood driving south on Edith Street. When he attempted to cross Church Street, his car struck the Davidson car on the right side, pushing it around so that it struck the front of Ray Bessey's car. Mr. Bessey had been proceeding east on Church, had seen the accident about to happen and had come to a stop when his car was struck. All drivers were alone in their cars, and none were injured. Constable Tom Dudy investigated the accident.

The other accident took place on May 8th when a Mercury dump truck owned by the Milton Lumber Company, Milton, and a dump truck owned by Meadowglen Growers of town collided when both entered the intersection at the same time. The time of the accident was at 3:30 p.m., and Constable D. R. Smith investigated.

Alex Sheppard, Milton drove the Mercury truck, which suffered damages amounting to \$350. The Meadowglen Growers truck was driven by Claude Reid, 110 Mountainview Road. Damages to the front part of his truck cost \$125.

ELORA LADY EDITOR WOMAN OF THE YEAR

Mrs. Katharine Marston, Elora, editor of the Elora Express, was named newspaper woman of the year by the Ontario Weekly Newspapers Association.

Mrs. Marston, recipient of 14 other awards during her 15 years as owner and editor of the Express, was honored by the association for her work in getting the 400 acre Elora Gorge Park completed. Elora is 13 miles north of Guelph.

Mrs. Marston said in an interview she began campaigning in 1951 to have the gorge preserved as a public recreation spot for towns along the Grand River in western Ontario.

"It wasn't a new idea though," she said. "My grandfather was on a committee in 17 years ago to do the

Besides writing editorials in her newspaper which has a circulation of 800, she was chairman of the recreation advisory board for the Grand valley conservation authority which planned the park.

Mrs. Marston, who does all the reporting and editorial writing for her paper, said most of her past awards were for editorials.

"Sometimes I think I was crazy ever to get into this business," she said. "I never make any money. I've just won awards."

Mrs. Marston bought the paper shortly after her husband died in 1941, leaving her with four young children. One son, David, 20, is now running the mechanical side of the paper. Another, Donald, 21, is with the RCMP in Regina.
