For Smith & Stone Bowlers**

**Businessman 63 Years
Art Wilson Retiring**

One of the Canadian electrical industry's best-known "showmen", Arthur Wilson, vice president of Smith and Stone Limited, retires this month after building up a service record that matches the age of most men when they retire. He has been in the electrical field for 63 years — 25 of them with Smith and Stone.

A salary of \$100 a year was all that was required to attract him to the infant industry sixty-three years ago, but Art Wilson makes no claim to exceptional foresight. "As a fourteen-year-old boy, he says, "It was the \$100 that looked good to me. I don't believe I was too concerned about the long-term growth prospects at that time, but looking back, I can't think of a line that, 80 years ago, offered more opportunities for development than the electrical business."

One of the opportunities was the flashlight salesman in Canada, and his talents for showmanlike demonstration earned him the swed interest usually accorded a magician. For it wasn't just the flashlight itself that had to be demonstrated. The whole idea of carrying your own mechanical light had to be "sold" — not a simple proposition in the case of the first flashlight introduced in this country.

Art Wilson's first job was with the Canadian General Electric Company as a mail boy. For a man who says he didn't force the great possibilities in the electrical industry when he entered it, he showed a remarkable ability to grow with it. In rapid succession he rose to shipper, assistant superintendent of warehouse, superintendent and then was transferred to the sales department. By the time he was 20 he was out on the road as an experienced company representative.

Being out on the road in those days was a different proposition than it is now, Mr. Wilson says.

"The average traveller today doesn't really know his customers. We used to spend evenings and Sundays with our customers. We visited their homes and got to know their families. They looked to us for news."

And more than news, evidently "When we called on contractors, we generally had to tell them what to use," he says. "There were no electricians — just handy men. Wheelwrights used to do all the mechanical work."

Wilson believes that quality and price of your goods are only a part of selling a product. "By themselves they aren't worth much unless the salesman does it, everything possible to give service."

In his early days on the road, he carried this service aspect of his business pretty far. When he visited owners of private power stations he was often asked to take on the job of firing the boilers while the owners had a rare evening out.

The Canadian National Exhibition is sort of a corporation counterpart of Art Wilson. He has been an annual visitor throughout his career. Lately, however, he has stayed close to the electrical building where he meets his old-time friends. It's a bad — and a rare — day when he is unable to remember a name, even when he hasn't seen its owner for ten years.

With two full generations of selling experience behind him, Art Wilson has this advice for anyone following the same career: "Put your company first and yourself second. Do it the other way around, and you won't make even a poor third."
