A new car narrowly entangled being crushed when John Noble moved it into the garage for servicing seconds before another large tree crashed down where it had been parked. At the sixth-line

a large elm was uprooted and blocked the road completely just south of the church until municipal workmen cut a path for traffic on Tuesday. At the seventh line the doors of the north side of the barn on the Lindsay farm were blown in, and in escaping the wind took off a large part of the east half of the roof. Several large trees suffered there as well.
