- JOBS FOR ALL: Democratic planning will keep everybody at work making the things we need houses, schools, hospitals, and the materials used in building them.
- 2. HOSPITAL AND HEALTH INSURANCE: The CCF proposes the immediate introduction of a province wide hospital insurance program as the first step towards complete health insurance SICKNESS BENEFITS: We propose a plan under which those who lose income because of sickness will receive compen-

sation in the same manner as workmen's compensation is now

- GOOD HOUSES: A public housing program will provide dec ent homes for all families at prices or rents they can afford, regardless of their means. Specifically, the CCF proposes the construction of 40,000 low cost, low rent homes over the next four years (as compared, with slightly more than 1,000 such homes constructed by the present government
- over the last five years.) PROTECTION OF HOME OWNERS: We propose legislation to protect families from losing their homes or farms in cases where they are unable to keep up their mortgage pay ments because of sickness, unemployment or other similar misfortune
- GRANTS FOR EDUCATION: The CCF will relieve the tax burden on homes and farms, and at the same time provide the means for meeting the increasing demand of our educational system, by increasing provincial grants for education to 50 per cent of the overall cost (from the present le vel of about 30 per cent)

- FARM SECURITY; The CCF proposes adequate.marketing legislation to establish stable farm prices. The effect of this will be not only that the farmers will enjoy a secure standard of living, but In addition they will be able to buy industrial products and thus help to maintain employment.
- NATURAL RESOURCES: Official government documents reyeal that our forest, and mineral resources are being brutally depleted, and only a pittance is being paid in royalties. The CCF will undertake a planned program of development of our natural resources, in which our great heritage will be used for the benefit of all our citizens and the interests of future generations will be protected.
- PROTECTION OF CONSUMERS: We advocate the establishment of a Consumers' Bureau as a public service, to give consumers independent expert information on the quality of goods placed on the market in Ontario, to control misleading advertising and to recommend appropriate action for reducing unreasonable price spreads.
- 10. PENSIONERS: A provincial supplement of \$20.00 per month to old age pensioners.
- 11. AUTO INSURANCE: A CCF public auto insurance program will cut premiums by at least one third and give better protection to the public.


