Last Monday, the Pine Room in Oakville Arena was the setting for a visit from Premier Leslie M. Frost, to Oakville and district residents.

There was an excellent crowd on hand to hear the premier who spoke very briefly, and then made a point of personally meeting everyone in the gathering.

Stanley L. Hall, member in the Ontario legislature for the past four terms, also spoke, asking the gathering's support, and saying that if re-elected for his fifth term, he would endeavour to do in the future, as he had in the past, to serve all the people of the county, regardless of political affiliations. He said he felt that the Frost Government had served the province and county well, he had been privileged to serve in that government and would feel honoured if the county sent him back to do so again.

President William Thomson, head of Oakville Conservative Association, introduced the speakers, and spoke very briefly, welcoming the gathering and urging every one to help elect the Frost government.

Refreshments were served and the affair was under the sponsorship of the Oakville Conservative Association.

Over three hundred people were present, with a large number from Georgetown attending.
