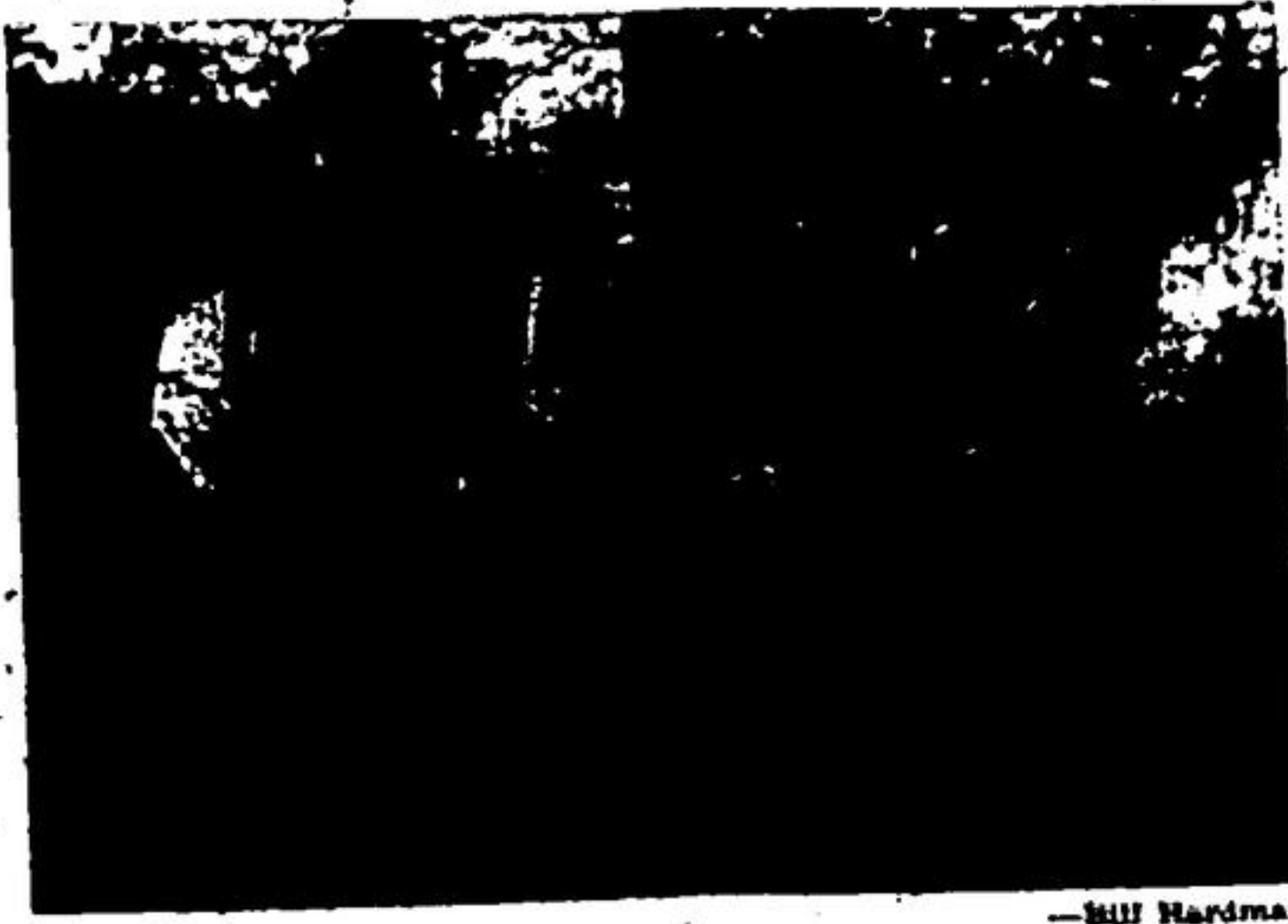


HOLIDAY OUTING FOR SCOUTS

WHAT COUNCIL DID

Ask Contractor Oil Cloverdale Roads

Still a troublesome problem for the Georgetown council, the roads in Cloverdale Heights came in for further discussion Monday.

Road chairman Allan Norton said that oiling is imperative to overcome heavy dust which is bothering subdivision residents and others in the area.

The town doesn't officially own the roads yet and Mayor Armstrong warned that if the town went in and oiled them, Georgetown might be accepting responsibility for work such as drainage which is the legal responsibility of Glat Construction.

It was finally decided to contact the construction firm immediately, ask them to have the roads oiled immediately, and that the town would rebate the oiling cost at a later date when the roads are completed and become Georgetown property.

Official word from the Ontario Provincial Police was received that they would be stopping policing duties in town at midnight June 30th, when the new town police force takes over.

The new engineer, Douglas R. Wilson, wrote that he would be commencing work here on June 20th.

Representatives Bill Jarvis and A. E. Brownlee of the Burroughs Co. discussed bookkeeping machines which they thought would be useful for tax and water billing. The machines available from this company are in a \$4,000 to \$8,000 price range.

Miss Jessie Leavitt was hired as a part-time assistant to assessment commissioner Joseph Gibbons, at a salary of \$35 a week.
