

### TRADES FLASHLIGHT FOR A DOLLAR BILL

Damage which could amount to over a hundred dollars was caused in a break-in which occurred at Wrigglesworth Public School late Thursday night or early Friday morning.

The thief, who has been christened "the dollar bill robber" left plenty of clues, but as yet OPP officers have been unsuccessful in locating him. Footprints of large rubber boots leading to several windows, and finally to the window he forced to gain entrance, gave one clue. A flashlight left behind was another. And the fact that a manual radio removed from the school was left in exactly the same location outside as was a large plate glass window in a break-in two

years ago, suggests a tie-in with that unsolved crime.

After entering the school, the intruder broke a door jamb to enter Principal William Kindrade's office. Here his efforts in looking for money caused major damage. Four metal drawers of a large filing cabinet were jimmied, and the cabinet rendered almost completely useless. Desk drawers were dumped and the contents scattered about the room.

It is thought that the man who broke in might have been looking for money which he might think was left after a kindergarten performance that evening. The show, as it turned out, was a free admission one.

For his trouble, plus flashlight, he got one dollar. Which, unless it is one of the Telegram Lucky Bucks, is worth just that — one dollar.
