

## Earl Wilson, Helen Vivian Awarded Championship Trips

Sixty Halton Junior Farmers were hosts recently to thirty Junior Farmers from the neighboring county of Peel. It was the occasion of their respective annual livestock judging competition. Art Bennett, associate agricultural representative for Halton

and Peel Counties, was in charge of the cavalcade of 90 Juniors who judged Percherons at Stanley May's; Holsteins; Ken Ella's for Jerseys; Fred Nurse's for Yorkshires; W. H. Merry's for Shorthorns; Joyce Brod. for Guernseys; and finally to J. H. Willmott & Son's for Hampshires and Angus — a total of ten classes.

In the afternoon the young men each gave oral reasons on five of the classes judged during the morning. The official judges were J. H. Willmott, J. H. McCullough, Brampton; Harold Hanna, Brampton and J. E. Whitelock.

### Top Livestock Judge

When the awards were announced they revealed John C. Willmott as the high livestock judge of the day with a score of 718 out of a possible 750. In second place was Dave Pelletier with 704; followed by John W. Pickett with 698. The Hamilton Spectator championship award was won by Earl Wilson, of Norval. This award is based on "Leadership"; "Participation in Junior Farmer Activities"; "Participation in 4-H Club Work"; and finally, judging ability over the past three years. The award was presented at the Milton Town Hall on the evening of the competition, by Frank Sercombe, district editor of the "Spec".

Another pleasing feature of the evening's programme was the announcement by Mrs. Mabel Borgstrom, Home Economist that the Halton W.I. championship award had been won by Helen Vivian of the Nelson Club.

\$2,000 will be spent on replacing sidewalk on Main Street North, from the White Bridge to Kennedy Street.

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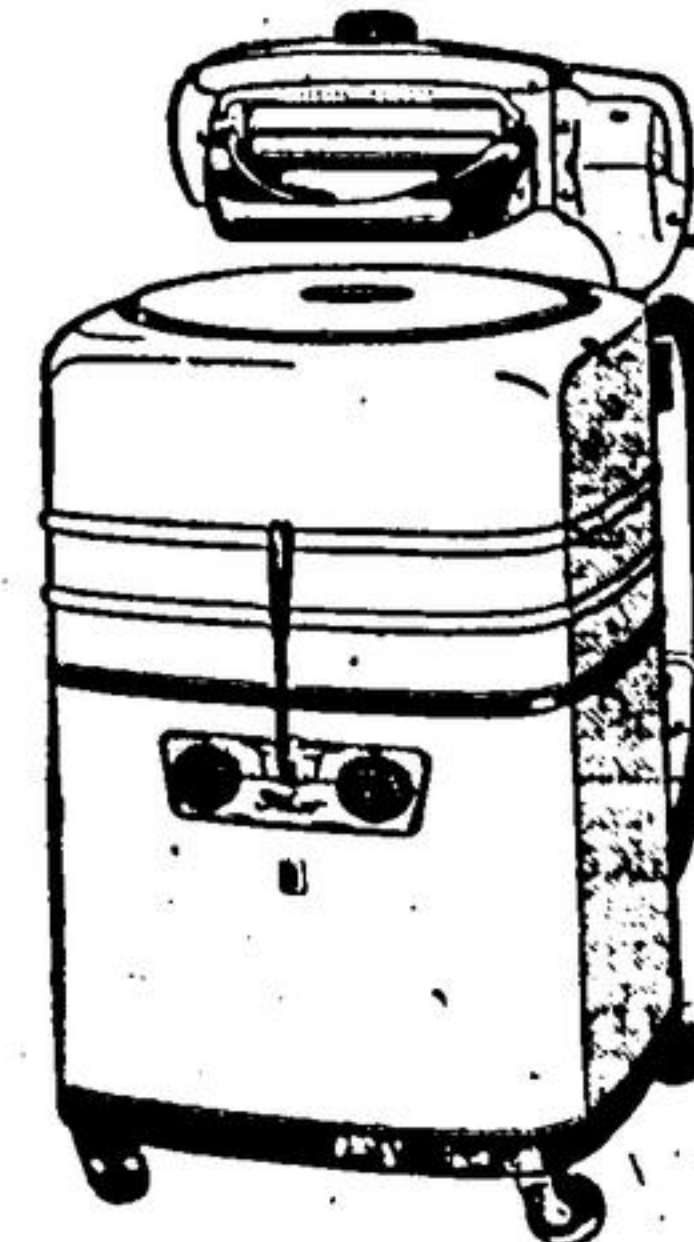


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
