Mrs. McArthur was the former Margaret Dwyer, daughter of the late Joseph and Ellen Dwyer of Peterboro. In addition to Mrs. Wilcox and Mr. Dwyer, Mrs. McArthur leaves another sister (Ellen) Mrs. Kenneth Cole, Oshawa, and two brothers Jack and James of Detroit. Also surviving Mrs. McArthur are her husband and 4 children; James and Michael of Oshawa, and Billy and Mrs. R. Anderson (June) of Toronto.

## Mrs. Fred L. Ruddell, 73 Pioneer Family Member

Descendant of two of Esquevas's oldest families, Janet E. Moore Ruddell, 73, died at the Flynn Nursing Home, Acton, on Saturday. She had been ill since suffering a severe stroke on May 5th.

Her parents, James Moore and Thomas Hume were both members of United Empire Loyalist families which settled in the Speyside district. She was born on their farm, lot 17, concession 3, and was a high school girl when they moved to Georgetown in 1897, to the present Moore farm on Main Street North.

She attended Milton Model School and Toronto Normal School, then taught at Hornby, Norval and the Stone School before her marriage in 1918 to Fred L. Ruddell. Her husband's farm on the 7th line backs the Moore property, and after Mr. Ruddell's death in 1928 she continued the operation of the farming business.

She was a member of Knox Presbyterian Church, the Stone School farm forum and Silver-Wood Women's Institute.

Surviving are two children, Jean who teaches at Wrigglesworth public school and James F., an engineer with the Defence Research Board at St. Bruno, Quebec. Three sisters, Misses Margaret, Edith and Isabelle Moore live on Main Street North. Two brothers and two sisters, Alexander, William, Mary and Elizabeth died in a diphtheria epidemic before the family moved to Georgetown.

Rev. Alex Calder conducted the funeral service yesterday at the McClure Funeral Home. Pallbearers were Frank Ruddell, John Devereaux, George Burt, Charles Greig, and Harvey Agnew and Wilbert Ford of Milton. Interment was in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown.
