Still another new housing subdivision is in Georgetown's future if council approves a preposal submitted by LeRoy Date, QC, at Monday's meet-

.Mr. Dale, who appeared . for the Misses Moore, dwners of a 100 acre farm on Main Street North, which is one of the last remaining farm properties in town limits, introduced Mr. Lane and Mr. Harrison who, with Mr. Alderson, are interested in buying a portion of the property for housing.

These gentlemen, said Mr. Dale, would be building some 220 houses within the next two years, on some 40 acres of land.

"Mr. Dale submitted a plan of the housing subdivision prepared by Dr. Faludi. "What does Dr. Faludi believe?"

said Reeve Stan Allen. "In a land use may, he shows this as an industrial area, and now we see a sketch for

Mr. Alles said the town is in no position to allow more large-scale housing without definite compensating industrial and commercial areas. There have been lay-offs at Malton, any more are anticipated, and many present residents, he said, will have to be absorbed into local industries.

"If we allow any more subdivisions without industry, it could wash up our agreement with Mr. Healop for

Delrex," he said. Cr. Thomas Lyons expressed con-

cern about rising school costs. Mr. Dale said he thought the town should consider the position of old residents like the Misses Moore, whose land is valueless if it cannot be sold. They are no longer in a position to farm it, and he knows of no offer that has ever been made for purchase by any industry.

"It might be 20 years before industry would be interested in this," he said "and it would be unfair to put such long term restrictions on land use." The CNR, he added, has held an industrial property for 40 years without selling it.

Some 50 per cent of Halton voters went to the polls. The Conservatives scored a majority in every municipality in the county, believed to be a record for any political party in this county's history.

Thursday, Mr. Hall received 8,433 votes; Bill Anderson (Lab). 5023; and Stan Allen (CCF) 3405.

In 1951, results were: Hall 9,042; Dr. Wm. Deans (Lib.) 6,272; Angus Langlille (CCF) 2193. Both old parties lost some ground to Georgetown's reeve, an energetic campaigner who was a federal candidate in

The Liberals were closest in Faquesing, where the candidates registered 633, 627 and 322 respectively.
