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DISTRICT RESIDENT SEVENTY-FIVE YEARS

On Tuesday, June 7th, Henry Fryer, a resident of Georgetown for many years, died at his home, 45 King Street. He was in his 84th year.

Mr. Pryer was born in Kent County, England, the son of the late Thomas and Elizabeth Fryer. After the death of his father, he came out to Canada with his mother and sister, while still in his teens. He came to Milton, where for a number of years he was employed on the farm of the late William Cleave, later moving with him to Georgetown when he purchased his farm here.

On December 9, 1897, he married the former Bartha Hawes of Georgetown, who predeceased her husband in October, 1948. Mr. and Mrs. Pryer purchased a farm in Glanford Twp. near Mount Hope, where they hard for a number of years. After selling it in 1927, the family moved to Acton, and then to Georgetown in 1934. For the past 15 years. Mr. Fryer had been in poor health and had lived very quietly. He was a member of The Reliable Life Insurance Society and a staunch Conservative in politics, in which he was always keenly interested. He was a member of St. George's 'Anglican Church.

Rev. Kenneth Richardson took the funeral service at McClure's Funeral Home on Thursday, afternoon at 3.00 o'clock. The pall bearers were Stan Lyon and five nephews: William Fryer, Toronto; Walter, Alfred and George Fryer of Actun; and Herbert Fryer of Guelph.

Mr Fryer has only one brother surviving him, Thomas, of Hagersville. He leaves three children, Fredrick, Louise and Jessie, all of Georgetown.

WHAT COUNCIL DID

REEVE SAYS MILTON ROAD TO BE PAVED

Referring to a recent editorial in the Herald which complained about a poor county road between Georgetown and Milton, Reeve Stan Allen, who is a member of the county road committee this year, told council Monday that definite action is being taken this year

"It has been decided," Mr. Allen said, to dig out the road between Hornby and No 25 highway, compact a base artificially and pave it this

Only 412 miles of county roads are in condition to be paved this year, he said, without artificial compacting.

· Cr Walter Gray recommends creating a "no parking" area on the past office curve. There is a possibility, he thinks, of creating parking space for a dozen cars by filling in a ditch across the road beside Georgetown Lumber property. This will be investigated

A sewer extension, costing \$1300, is to be made on River Drive, to service the new Varian Associates plant. It will also serve some three houses across the road not presently served

Cr. Thomas Lyons brought up the problem of cars using the park as a speedway. Mayor Armstrong agreed with him, saying that on Sunday it had been reported that two cars had a race around the track. He is concerned that children playing are endangered, and is also annoyed because the infield which is being fixed up and seeded is being wrecked by car

Some more fencing is to be placed in the park, and a more intensive police patrol inaugurated.

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
