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Former Peel Warden Jack McLaughlin Dies

Jack McLaughlin, who served for many years on Brampton town council and was reeve of the town in 1931, died suddenly at Peel Memorial Hospital, June 8th. Mr. McLaughlin was also, at one time, warden of Peel County. He had in addition served 5 years on the hydro commission.

His service on council included five years as a councillor and three as deputy-reeve.

A member of the local curling and bowling clubs for many years, he was particularly active in the latter, being chairman of the membership committee. Mr. McLaughlin was a prominent member of St. Paul's United Church. He had made his home at 89 Elizabeth Street S. for the past quarter century and was widely known in the building trade. He was for years connected with Brampton Lumber Co. and had also conducted a coal and wood business on Park Street under his own name.

Coming to Brampton from Northern Ontario he had always shown a keen interest in the town's development.
