Clifford Hibbert Joins Municipal Office Staff

fice staff. Council had originally advertised for a lady assistant and six applications were read at the meeting Monday. When the applications were being discussed, Reeve Stan Allen brought up the question of hiring Mr. Hibbert, who had applied for the job of assistant clerk when Clarence Benham was hired recently. He will receive a \$2500 salary.

Assessment commissioner Joseph. Gibbons received an increase in car allowance to \$250 from the previous \$100, in view of the larger territory which he must now cover in his dut-

Mayor Armstrong said that the administrative committee had discussed with town clerk John D. Kelly the hiring of temporary help to aid in water billing, as this work is behind schedule: Mrs. Thomas Eason was engaged for this and will be paid \$35 a week during the time she is work-

The new engineer, Douglas Wilson, who started his duties Monday was introduced to council. He will be taking over the job of building inspector also, from George Adams the first of July.

Cr. Walter Gray lost out in a plan to provide extra parking space across from the post office, when council members were deadlocked 4 to 4 in

Mr. Gray suggested that land adjoining the Georgetown Lumber property be filled in, a cement abutment erected and parking space for several cars created.

"We have been dealing with a lot of big questions like the Heslop development and a waterworks system" he said "but there are some small things too which are important. I'm getting disgusted with parking and driving conditions downtown, and it's time we took some action on these

problems." Mayor Armstrong said there is merit in the idea, but he could not fully approve an expenditure of several hundred dollars when mail delivery looms in the future. When that time comes, congested parking at the post office will remedy itself, he said.

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Part of the contract for the new waterworks extension was awarded

at Monday's council meeting. Dunker Construction Co., Kitchener, lowest of two tenderers for erection of a new pump house, reservoir and other buildings, will receive \$82,404 for this part of the work. Consulting engineer Mr. Reberts, of the Philips and Roberts firm, was present

to discuss the matter with council. Only one tender was received for laying water pipelines which will service the new Delrex subdivision from a route along the unopened part of Maple Ave. Two others have indicated a desire to bid on this job which will be more expensive than the Dunker contract, and decision has been deferred for a week on two. Johnston Bros Co. have submitted a bid which engineer Roberts approved of, though he said it was considerably higher than his estimates. Mr. Smith, representing Cornish Construction, and town works superintendent Ern Hyde also spoke on the matter at the meet-
