**Plan Reforestation
Of Caledon Forest**

The Credit Valley Conservation Authority decided to purchase the county forest, on the 4th concession of Caledon, for the sum of \$1300, in order to carry out a reforestation scheme there. This decision was made at the sixth meeting of the Authority on May 25th, at the Esquering Municipal Hall, Stewarttown.

The meeting also decided that a proposed budget of \$2,000 annually be set for a reforestation scheme as outlined in the Forestry Section of the Credit Valley Conservation Report. The minister of lands and forests will be contacted and asked to enter into an agreement with the Credit Valley Conservation Authority to manage the Authority forests.

A discussion took place as to whether an agreement of sale or an option would be advisable for the McMurphy property at Huttonville. The option appeared the better choice and it was suggested it might be taken for possibly \$100. The board on flood control was asked to bring in a definite proposal for the property, obtaining an option thereon, and to sug-

gest a basis for the apportionment of costs between municipalities.

Alex MacLaren, Georgetown, outlined the plan of the Advisory Board on Land Use and Farm Planning to carry out demonstration projects related to farm gulley control. The Authority authorized the spending of up to \$500 on the Farm Gulley Project as a conservation demonstration under the direction of the farm planning and land use advisory board.

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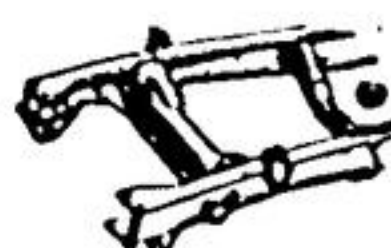
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
