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

Approve Subdivision On Mesdowglen Property

A new subdivision in Esquesing Township will add five houses between Georgetown and Glen Williams on part of the Meadowglen Growers acresse

At last week's township council meeting, a by-law restricted used of the land to residential purposes, and will allow only single family dwellings to be built on the five lots.

The new aubdivision will take most of the Meadowglen property which is outside Georgetown limits.

The township is floating a \$25,000 debenture issue to pay for the new school at Milton Heights, and tenders have been asked for purchase of the debentures.

Onwers of poultry killed by dogs will be compensated by the township from now on. A by-law providing for this was passed at the meeting.

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
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
