

A business trip to England was shortened for Fred Cotton by the sudden death in Toronto of his father-in-law Ben Mannis.

Mr. Mannis, a retired businessman who once operated the Hudson Fur Co. in the city died in a doctor's office from a sudden heart attack a week ago Friday. Mr. Cotton flew home from England, arriving Sunday afternoon a few hours after the funeral service.

The deceased leaves a family of three children, Mrs. Fred Cotton, Mrs. Jack Korman and Harry Mannis, wellknown CEC news announcer. The latter has been seriously ill in hospital since his father's death and underwent a major operation, last week.

The Cotton Brothers, Fred and Jack who operate clothing stores in Georgetown and Brampton were on a buying trip in England when Mr. Mannis' death occurred. Jack returned home last Sunday,

They had planned to visit Paris and Rome, but Fred's sudden return home cancelled these arrangements They report a definite trend in England to continental styles for both men's and ladies' fashions.

The brothers visited their father's sister in London, Mrs. Kay and Jack also renewed acquaintances with his wife's parents, Mr. and Mrs. S. Marks and her sister and three brothers, all of whom live in the London area.
