Explains Civil Defence As Vital Organization

Georgetown's first move to form a civil defence organization was taken Wednesday when representatives of various organizations heard Major J. H. Adams, provincial coordinator, explain how such an organization can be invaluable not only in time of war but in peacetime disaster also.

The meeting was called by Lt. Col. John R. Barber, recently appointed by council as local coordinator, and Leslie Clark and Harold McClure, members of the committee.

Col. Barber, in introducing the guest speaker, said that civil defence is only common sense, evaluating what we have, where it is and how we can use it as fast and best as possible.

Major Adams showed movies of the A bomb attacks on Hiroshima and Nagasaki, then translated this damage into what would have happened in the Toronto area. His statistics were frightening and sobering, especially when he explained that hydrogen bombs dropped on Collingwood would have a "fall out area" stretching as far as Fort Erie which would have to be evacuated with 8 hours of a bomb blast.

Primary wartime objective of civil defence is to save life, he said, secondly to minimize the effects of disaster and to restore a community as quickly as possible.

"We insure ourselves privately," he concluded, "this is community insurance," and urged Georgetown to create a civil defence organization.
