Halton and Waterloo counties shared the honours. as each county ran up a total of 55

No runs were scored in the bottom of the seventh nor in either half of the eighth or ninth. Halton morale was mighty low, when Perth scored a run in the top of the tenth It was even lower when Halton's first two batters struck out in the bottom of the tenth However, the next batter. Doreen Ford, was safe on a close play at first base which set the stage for the real heroines of the day. Marilyn May hit a double which scored the tying run Sister Betty not to be outdone, smashed another double to score the winning run A fitting climax to another successful undertaking of the Halton Junior Farmers.

Local Resident's Father Dies in South Africa

Mr. and Mrs. Tom Ferguson received word last week of the sudden death of Mr. Ferguson's father, Thomas Ferguson, in Johannesburg, South Africa, on June 12th.

Mr. Ferguson was born in Dennylounhead, Stirlingshire, Scotland in 1887. In his youth he was a professional footballer. Three times amateur Internationalist, he was chosen to play against England, Ireland and Wales and also toured South America with the Scottish Internationalist Soccer team. He was associated with Alexander Bus Lines, Falkirk, for about twenty years, retiring as executive traffic comptroller and a mem-

ber of the board. Mr. Perguson settled in South Africa following the death of his wife Jean Stark, in 1950, travelling on the first commercial flight of the Comet jetliner to Johannesburg. He is survived by two sons, Tdm of Georgetown and Dr. Ian Perguson, who is serving with the British Army Malaya. Two other sons, Bruce and Gordon, were killed while serving with the RAF during the wer.

he watt-hour meter that measures the electricity you use is made with the same precision as a fine watch. Sealed to withstand dust and moisture, its sapphire-jewelled bearings never need oil. It is designed to operate efficiently and accurately at all temperatures and is periodically checked by Dominion Government Inspectors.

Electricity is metered in kilowatt-hours (1,000 watts used for one hour). The small dial, at the bottom of the meter illustrated measures 1/10th of a kilowatt-hour. On completion of one revolution, the dial at the right moves one unit to show one kilowatt-hour. Similarly, the three other dials indicate, from right to left, units of ten, one hundred and one thousand kilowatt-hoursyour meter, at all times maintains an accurate record of the small amount of low-cost electricity required to provide a better way of living.
