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### OPP Officers Assigned To Four Other Towns

Your local officers of the Oniario Provincial Police will be leaving Georgetown in different directions this week-end when the Georgetown detachment is dishanded to be ruplaced by a town police force.

The new police force, under Chief Roy Haley, takes over officially at midnight Thursday.

The change was necessitated when touncil was informed early this year that the OPP was taking its personnel out of small towns the end of the year. Anticipating difficulty in securing men if they waited until fall, council decided to act fast and engage men for policing before the deadline. Shortly after the new chief was hired, there was another change in policy at Queen's Park, and it was decided to retain the OPP in towns under 5,000, but the news came too late for Georgetown to reverse any decisions made.

Corporal Ray Beckett, who succeeded Col. Joe McBain here a year ago is going to Dundas headquarters. Cat. Tom Dube, who has served longest in Georgetown, for 21/2 years, will now be stationed in Oakville.

Cst. Don Smith, in town since last October is going to Waterdown, Cat. Guy Harrington, newest member of the detachment has been in town since the first of the year, and will be stationed in Brantford.

Georgetown's 4-man police furce. headed by Chief Constable Haley includes Constables Clifford Inch and Clifford Search and Probationary Constable Alexander Macleod.
