HALTON CONTESTANTS AT "DAIRY DAY"

Teams from 15 counties competed at the Quality Milk Competitions which were a part of the programme at Ontario's Dairy Days, held at Kemptville Agricultural School last week. A full programme of demonstrations and exhibits portrayed the very latest in the dairy industry to the large crowd of Eastern Ontario farm people in attendance. In spite of the distance involved Halton County was worthily represented in the Quality Milk Competitions by Jean Peterson, first vice president of Halton Junior Farmers; and Roy Ford, treasurer of the Halton Junior Farmers. Competing as a team, they were required to prepare cows for milking, milk one cow, care for the milk, and wash up the equipment, and at the same time provide a running commentary on how and why quality milk should be produced.

The Halton team placed 5th in the keenly contested competitions, in which Peterboro County duplicated the record of Halton's 1954 team by winning the team competition and the "Dairy Maid" and "Dairy Man" awards.
