Tenders are Called for New Town Swimming Pool

One of the most important meetings in Lions Club history took place last night when Dick Licats and Ab Tennant of the swimming pool committee informed the meeting that tenders have been called for its construction. A decision on a contractor will be made and work started on the pool, it is hoped within three weeks.

The pool, estimated to cost about \$50,000 will be built behind the arens in the flats behind Victoria Crescent. The Lions Club is sparking a fund campaign which it is hoped will be joined by other organizations to provide this long-needed addition to Georgetown's recreational facilities.

as the total rises. Plans call for a pool 105 feet by 45 feet, with filtration equipment, ladders, diving board and fencing. Town water will be used, and the filtration system provides for using the same water, purified, over and over again, which will keep it at a good temperature for swimming

Lion J. G. Collier reported a total of \$658 for the pool from peanut day, and a \$145 donation from the Boy Scout auxiliary.


