Halton Farmers to Visit Cayuga Research Station

In 1962 the Dept of Solls and Agricultural Engineering at the Ont. College established a regional research station, near Cayuge in Haldimand County. The purpose of this regional research station was to study the management problems and fertility requirements of the heavy and fine textured soils. The counties of Halton, Haldimand, Lincoln, Peel, Welland and Wentworth all have considerable areas of this type of soil, and it was the feeling of many soil and crop lesders that experimental results secured on the soils at Guelph may not ap-

ply on these heavier soils. During the past three or four years therefore, the Departments' referred to above have conducted studies and experimental work pertaining to tillage, liming, irrigation, soil conditioners, rotations and fertility. In order that the farm operators of the six counties concerned may have an opportunity of seeing for themselves the results secured, a joint field day sponsored by Soil and Crop Improvement Assoc. of the six counties, is being held at the Research Station

near Cayuga, on Friday, July 8th E. R. Segsworth, president of the Halton association, says that one or more buses will be chartered to take down the Halton delegation. The programme is scheduled to commence at 1 pm, when C. D. 


