

Service, B.A., BD of Howard Park United Church in Toronto to pay tribute to his late friend and classmate, Rev A. Ross Muir. 53. in Norval on Saturday afternoon, July 2nd.

Mr. Muir, a native of Guelph, died in Toronto General Hospital on Thursday, July 30th, affer a month's illness. He was ordained as a minister of the United Church of Canada in-1932, and served churches in both northern and southern Ontario for twenty-three years. Municipality of the County of Halton Bylaw No. 947

A By-Law to regulate the location of Buildings and Structures on land adjacent to County Roads:

WHEREAS it is deemed necessary and desirable to regulate the location of buildings and structures on land adjacent to county

WHEREAS authority is granted under Section 30a of The Highway Improvement Act as amended by Section 2 of The Highway Amendment Act, 1954 to exercise such power subject to the approval of the Municipal Board

Now, Therefore, The Council of the Corporation of the County of Halton enacts as follows:

1. No person shall erect any building or structure any part or which is located closer to the centre line of the original road allowance than sixty eight (68) feet on any county road as defined in By-Laws No. 537, 614, 627, 628, 681, 700, 754, 785 except on the following county roads or parts thereof, as listed in section 2, where the distance shall be seventy five (75) feet from the centre line of the original road allowance.

2. The county roads or parts of county roads referred to in section 1, are as follows:

ROAD NO. 1: From Provincial Highway No. 5 to the northerly limit of Con. 2, NDS, Twp. of Nelson.

ROAD NO. 2: From the northerly limit of Bronte to Provincial Highway No. 5 Twp. of Trafalgar.

ROAD NO. 3: From the Queen Elizabeth Way to Provincial Highway No. 5 Twp. of Trafalgar. ROAD NO. 14: Twp. of Nelson.

3. Any person convicted of a breach of any provisions of this By-Law shall forfeit and pay, at the discretion of the convicting magistrate a penalty not exceeding the sum of \$50.00 for each offence, exclusive of costs."

4. This By-law shall come into effect upon the day that, it is pased by Council subject to the approval of the Ontario Municipal Board.
