WHAT COUNCIL DID

EXPECT NATURAL GAS HERE WITHIN NEXT SIX MONTHS

Georgetown may have natural gas within six months. Monday, council gave the first two readings to a by-law which would grant a franchise to Halton Natural Gas Co., to supply gas for industrial and domestic use in town. The by-law must have approval of the Ontario Fuel Board before the council gives it third reading. There is a 6 month time clause in the by-law which cancels it if the company cannot produce results in that time. Messrs. Bealey and Brooks, representing the company, appeared at the meeting. They had just come from Milton where the council of that town had taken similar action that night.

Cr. Walter Gray said he plans at the next meeting to suggest no parking on the south side of Church St. and will also suggest that no U turns be allowed where the street enters Main.

Cr. Theo Lyons spoke for the property committee and recommended the town retain ownership of land which Pat Vance and Frank Toet want to buy behind their Churchhill Crescent property. It is a water course, he said, and could give trouble in future if it were filled in.

A desk, cabinet and bookcase were ordered for the engineer's office.

Concern over low water supply last week is past, said Reeve Allen. Pressure was low one night, and the engineer and members of the water committee spent most of the night at the Silvercreek reservoir checking. Mr. Allen said the town well is producing as well as it ever did, and the water situation is now normal.

Anthony Gas and Oil Explorations invited council to attend a drilling ceremony tonight at the Koens farm on No. 7 near Guelph, and a high-lead demonstration tomorrow at the McDonald farm in the Scotch Block.

Archie Girard discussed the possibility of erecting a new store closer to the street than the 25 feet required by the building by-law. Council made no decision and asked him to see if he could plan his building to conform with the by-law.

A \$1800 storm sewer was ordered to service part of Churchill Crescent.

Bob McMaster Hero as Glen Child Rescued

On Thursday, July 7th, at five o'clock, a near tragedy was averted by the quick thinking of Mr. Robert McMaster. Little Tommy Hayes was bathing in the Credit River. Glen Williams, across from the McMaster home, when suddenly his parents saw that he was in difficulties. They called for help and Mr. McMaster and Mr. Doug Fendley heard her. Mr. Fendley slipped on the rocks getting into the river and badly injured his shoulder. Mr. McMaster managed to reach Tommy and bring him out of the water. He applied artificial respiration and soon the lad responded.

The McClure ambulance, and the fire department had been called by Mrs. McMaster but fortunately they were not needed. Dr. C. V. Williams who had also been called by Mrs. McMaster pronounced Tommy in good condition before he left.

This is the second time in less than a week that the firemen have been called with their drowning rescue equipment. Saturday evening, July 2nd, they were called when Mr. Einar Poulsen was drowned at the 10th line bridge. Mr. McMaster has been responsible for saving others at the same place several times. It will be remembered that he helped a great deal when Bill Laley's truck went into the river.
