Jack Tarzwell Promoted RCAF Flight Lieutenant

Flying Officer Jack A. Tarzwell, 35, of Georgetown and Acton, has been promoted to the rank of Flight Lieutenant, effective July 1st, it has been announced by Air Force headquarters.

F.L. Tarzwell began his air force career in July, 1941 and went overseas in 1942 to serve as air frame mechanic with 405 Tailfin Squadron in Bomber Command. He later became a navigator and served with No. 357 RAF squadron on supply dropping duties in India and Burma.

In 1946, after returning to Canada and leaving the service, he attended Queen's University, graduating with a Bachelor of Science degree.

F.L. Tarzwell rejoined the RCAF in November, 1950, in the armament branch. He served overseas as an armament officer with 418 Sabre Squadron, one of the squadron's in the RCAF's No. 1 Air Division in Europe, until 1953, when he returned to Canada to his current post in the Directorate of Armament Engineering at air force headquarters. Lorne Scots Attend Niagara Camp July 23

Units of the Canadian army (militia) throughout Ontario are now making plans for a brief period of concentrated training at a summer camp. This period is of vital importance to the overall effectiveness of the militia. It culminates local winter training with an opportunity for units to carry out more extensive field exercises and complete various essential qualifications. Major - General H. D. Graham, GOC, Central Command, said this week.

For the majority of units the camp period will be one week. Employers of militia troops in the province always have given their finest cooperation in releasing men from normal work in order that they may attend camp with their unit.

"I am sure that this same spirit of friendly assistance will prevail this year," he said.

The coming Summer training program for the army carries a more pronounced importance than in any year since the end of the Second World War. It will be the first summer that units will attend camp since the militia reorganization which took place last fall.

"Citizen armies have provided the greater strength of the nation in times of strife and war. As long as the world remains divided Canada's militia will grow in importance and retain a unique position with the Western Alliance. The man who maintains an association as a soldier of the militia is helping both himself and his country," said General Graham.

The Lorne Scots, Peel, Dufferin and Halton Regiment will go to Niagara-on-the-Lake camp from July 23 to 30 as part of the Royal Canadian Infantry Corps.
