Hail . . . and Farewell!

The departure of Ontario Provincial Police to be replaced by a local policing system marks still another phase of Georgetown's development from a small town to a larger one.

It is proper at this time to pay tribute to a succession of OPP officers who have fulfilled their duties faithfully and well, and more particularly to the last four officers who have fitted well, not only into their jobs, but into community life in general. Cpl. Beckett and Constables Doby, Smith and Harrington have been worthy representatives of their profession. If our new police officers live up to the standard they have set, then Georgetown should be satisfied.

Chief Roy Haley has been around longer than his three officers and should be by now a fairly

familiar figure downtown. The officers, whom we unfortunately misnamed in a news item a few weeks ago are Forrest Inch, Clifford Found and Alexander Macleod.

Coming here as strangers will be a definite advantage to them and to the town, for they will not be subject to any preconceived opinions of any citizen and they and their work will be judged on its merit.

We welcome them as important citizens; confident that they will uphold the people's trust as expressed by council in entrusting them with safeguarding law and order in a town which has always been noted for its law-abiding citizenry. We must all cooperate with them in maintaining this reputation.

Stay Away From Real Estate

Action of council in considering purchase of an expensive property for future resale, even though indications might be that the town could make money on the deal, is not, in our opinion, wise business.

Council has quite enough to do with the ordinary routine of business, plus all the major things like waterworks, sewerage, subdivisions and roads, without getting into property dealing and all its dangers. And most certainly, no property should be acquired without ratepayers, who will foot the bill, voting on the question.

Admittedly, town council is in a ticklish situation, and we're glad we don't have to supply the answer. Georgetown has committed Delrex Developments to an agreement which binds that company to provide a proportion of industrial and commercial assessment

for each group of houses erected.

It is morally, if not legally, necessary to expect other subdividers to do the same. Council, seeing this, has temporarily stalled two proposed subdivisions. Whether the town can continue to do this indefinitely is a point of law with which we are unfamiliar. On the other side of the picture, of course, is whether it is proper to refuse to allow a person to sell their own property — which is practically what is being done by refusing to okay a housing subdivision.

While we haven't the answer, we don't think town purchase of an \$80,000 property is it. We should rather see representation from the council to subdividers that they sign agreements similar to Delrex, to maintain the balance demanded of that company.

One Tragedy Enough

One drowning tragedy this summer is more than enough for a town, and it is to be hoped that it will be the last sad news printed in the Herald this season.

It is the second time in the past few weeks that a drowning has occurred in the deceptively calm creek below the 10th Line Bridge near Glen Williams. In both cases the victims were strangers to the area, and no doubt uninformed about the swift current and the deep hole near the bridge.

We would suggest that the township council er-

ect a sign warning people to use caution in bathing there. A few dollars spent on carpentry could save a life.

We aren't familiar with ownership of the land bordering the creek. If it is privately owned, if the owner allows the public to use his property, we know he would be agreeable to erection of a warning sign.

It is to be hoped that the township will act immediately to help avoid any future tragic accidents which mar the happy season.
