

## Irene Young Saturday Bride In Knox Presbyterian Church

### Brother Retires as Winnipeg Principal

A school principal on the Winnipeg teaching staff for 41 years, Dr. E. F. Willoughby retired in June. A brother of Mrs. Harry Stockford of town, he was a resident here many years ago, when his brother, the late Rev. Bertram Willoughby was minister of the Congregational Church.

A surprise farewell was planned at Kelvin high school on the Monday before school closed. The fire bell rang and Dr. Willoughby hurried out of the school to find himself on a platform before an assembly of some 900 students and guests. Even his wife had kept the secret from him.

Principal of Kelvin since 1948, he has been a teacher in Winnipeg since going there in 1914. From 1938 to 1948 he was principal of Mulvey junior high school. Born in Stouffville, he taught in an Ontario rural school for 2½ years before going to Winnipeg.

The biggest thrill I've found in teaching," says Dr. Willoughby, "is that I'm continually running across former students who have distinguished careers and found their place in the community."

An enthusiastic sportsman he has coached high school, baseball and hockey throughout his teaching career. He and his wife plan to spend the summer in Calgary where their daughter lives, but will continue to live in Winnipeg.

At the farewell, the principal was given a television set from the student body. Later in the week, there was a reception attended by former students, staff members and other friends.

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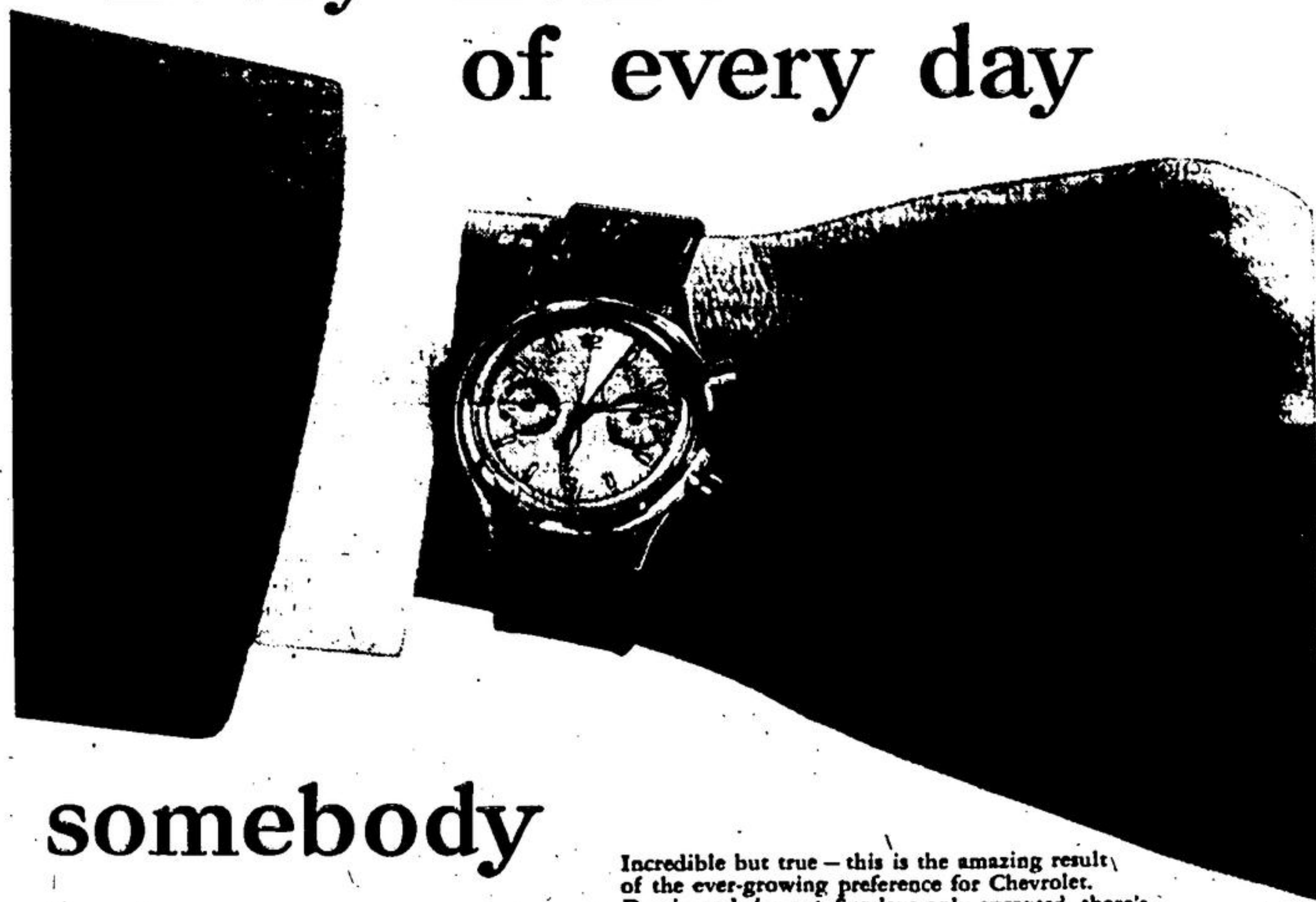
