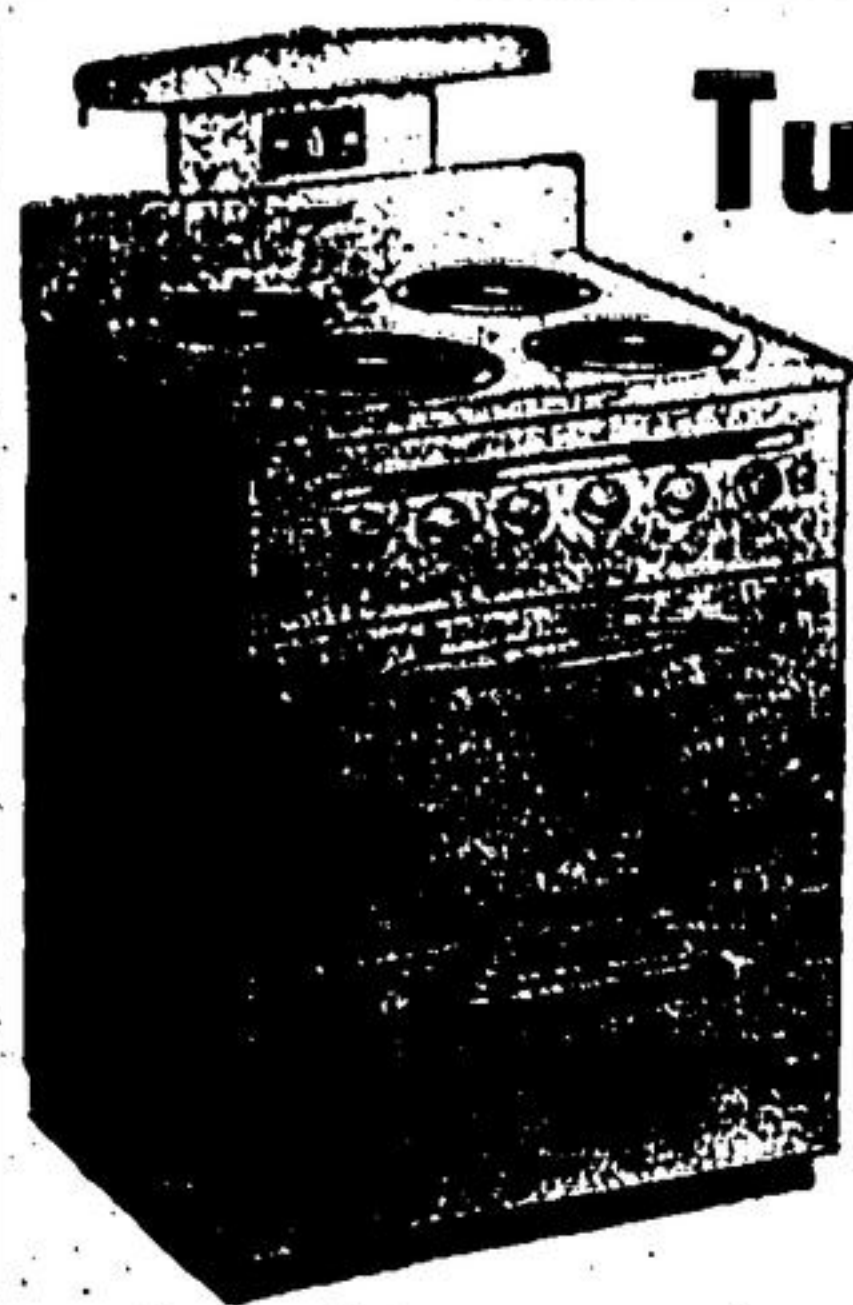

Mackenzie Firm Gets Milton School Job

The local contracting firm of J. B. Mackenzie and Son, Ltd., has been awarded a contract for building a 2-room addition to Milton high school. The firm's bid of \$28,940 was lowest of five tenders received by North Halton district school board. Barnett and Hieder are architects for the building.

Lloyd Marks Opening Canadian Tire Store

Another new business will open in Georgetown this week.
Lloyd Marks, who has given up a teaching position in Toronto to go into business for himself is opening a Canadian Tire Corporation store on the highway.

His new store here, which will have its official opening this Friday, is smartly styled with modern shelving, tile floors and plenty of display space.
